

CHANGE LAW RE LICENSE TO WED

Synod Committee Takes Steps for More Strict Regulations

Social Service Council Urged to Support Prison Farm Plan— Changes in Dioceses

The Social Service Council of the Anglican diocese met at a meeting in the Church of England Institute yesterday called upon the synod to make a first payment of the synod appointment of the maintenance of the Inter-Provincial Home for Women, which will open in Covedale next month.

The council also decided to communicate with the New Brunswick Social Service Council urging that body to strive for stricter laws with regard to the issuing of marriage licenses and also urging the provincial Social Service Council to support the efforts of every other organization in an endeavor to have a prison farm established.

of church literature and others present were the Bishop, Rev. H. A. Cady, Col. E. T. Sturges, Rowland Frith and Alfred Morley. The meeting elected Cortlandt Robb as treasurer of the board and heard satisfactory reports. Means of giving greater prominence to the Church Book store were discussed.

Bishop Richardson presided at the meeting of the Board of Education which received the report of Rothery Collegiate School for the year. The report showed an enrollment of more than 90 students and referred to the visit of Bishop MacKenley, co-adjutor bishop of Nova Scotia, who is an Old Boy of the school and who was the preacher in chapel at the college.

Another interesting visitor had been Dr. Renald, former headmaster of Winchester school, who is the secretary of the Rhodes Trust and who addressed the pupils of the school.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions met in the evening with Bishop Richardson presiding. Rev. Canon A. W. Daniel reported on his deputization work in the missions of Eldon, New Brandon, Greenwich and Burton. The treasurer submitted a report on the payments of the mission allotments to the Diocesan fund for missions and a report on the amount paid by all the congregations on the budget appropriation.

The total paid on the budget this year was \$25,189, as compared with \$24,780 last year, but in both years the payments were considerably below the objective.

The Bishop reported the following resignations and appointments: Rev. W. E. Best, resigned from Mission of Waterford; Rev. F. M. Sherlock, resigned as assistant at the Cathedral in Fredericton to go to the United States; Rev. David Jenkins, resigned from Grand Manan to go to Eastport, Me.; Rev. W. H. Lance, resigned from McAdam to go to Antigua, W. I.; Rev. J. V. Jones, resigned from Andover to go to the United States; Rev. C. J. Markham, resigned as curate of Trinity church, Saint John, to become rector of Stanley; Rev. W. E. Hale, resigned from Aberdeen and Bright to become rector of Gagetown; Rev. S. C. Gray resigned from Stanley to become rector of Woodstock.
