

OBSERVANCE OF PASSOVER'S BEGUN IN CITY

Jewish People Gather in Synagogue And Also Have Home Commemoration

The Feast of the Passover was ushered in last evening at sunset by the local Hebrews at the synagogue in Carleton street when services were conducted by the cantor, Rev. O. Mandelblatt. Following the service, the traditional Seder was carried out in all the homes of the Hebrew families, in commemoration of the deliverance of the Jewish people from the Egyptian yoke and also to commemorate their 40 years in the wilderness. This ceremony will be performed in the homes again this evening.

Services also were held this morning at 9 o'clock in the synagogue, Rev. Babb and Rev. T. J. Blits officiating. In addition, services are being conducted by the Junior Hebrew congregation in the school in Carleton street. The Passover will be brought to a conclusion on next Tuesday evening at sunset. This period is a time of rejoicing and not one of mourning, such as the day of Atonement.

CHAS. E. NEILL IN LONDON "CANADA"

Picture and Sketch of New Brunswick Now High in Financial World

"Canada," London, with its March 20 issue has a full page picture of Charles E. Neill, general manager of the Royal Bank of Canada and president of the Canadian Bankers' Association. As Mr. Neill is a New Brunswick man, people here will read with interest the sketch of his career with which "Canada" supplements its picture. It is as follows:

"The subject of our portrait supplement this week—a drawing specially made for Canada—is Charles Ernest Neill, who is this year's president of the Canadian Bankers' Association. Mr. Neill, who is a son of James Stewart Neill, was born on May 27, 1878, at Fredericton, New Brunswick, where he received his education at the Collegiate School under Dr. (later Sir George) Parkin. On leaving school, Mr. Neill entered the Royal Bank of Canada. He soon became manager of the Vancouver branch, then supervisor of British Columbia branches, and later went to Montreal as chief inspector. In 1907 he was appointed assistant general manager of the bank, and in January, 1916, was promoted to be general manager, which position he has continued to hold ever since.

"Among Mr. Neill's activities outside his field of finance, he is a governor of McGill University, the University of Montreal, the Mount Royal, St. James' and St. Lawrence, and the Montreal Amateur Athletic Association.

"Mr. Neill married in 1901 Miss Mary Louise Creer, daughter of the late John Creer, K. C. of Hamilton, another of whose daughters is the wife of Sir George McLaren Brown, European general manager of the Canadian Pacific Railway."

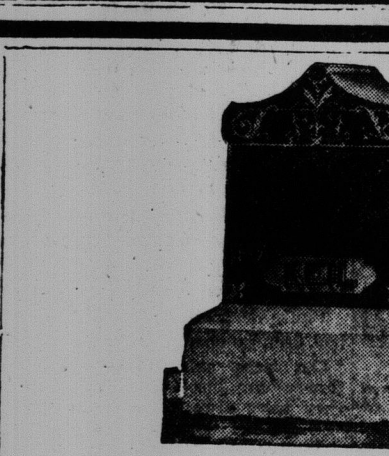

BESCO MAKES PACT IN NEWFOUNDLAND

New Arrangement re Ore Shipments and Freedom From Taxation

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., March 30.—The new British Empire Steel Corporation agreement, tabled in the House yesterday, provides:

Freedom from export duties on ore shipped from Bell Island for three years; 10 cents a ton export duty on one million tons; five cents a ton for the next million tons, and free above that amount for the period from 1929 to 1930; a rebate of five cents a ton to be allowed on such amount; the first million tons shipped to places within the Empire; exemption from income tax, exemption from municipal and local board taxation above \$10,000; free entries of explosives and mining equipment. The companies are to expend \$750,000 in improvements and equipments before 1931, and are to make suitable provision for housing miners. There is to be continuous operation to such a degree as sales warrant.

A house at 101 Rockland Road, owned by Charles Cobham, West Saint John, and occupied by Walter Niles and family was badly damaged by fire this morning. Neither the owner nor the tenant carried insurance.

About 9 o'clock the fire was first noticed and an alarm rung in from Box 813. The firemen made a quick response and found they had quite a fight on their hands. Two streams of water were soon at work and the blaze was brought under control, but not until the greater part of the roof had been burned off.

The fire was supposed to have started from a defective fuse in the attic of the building and had quite a start before it was discovered. The furniture in the lower floor was covered by the salvage corps workers, but the household effects were considerably damaged by water and smoke.

Such is the scene of "Flower of Night," a Paramount picture starring Pola Negri which opened yesterday at the Queen Square Theatre.

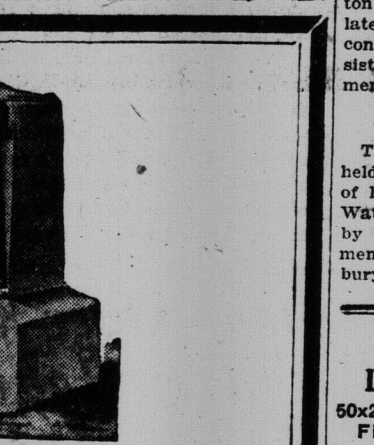

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WOULD TRANSFER TO AGRICULTURE DEPT.

C. C. Aard to Fredericton on Fox Breeders' Association Mission

The New Brunswick Fox Breeders' Association was seeking to be placed under the jurisdiction of the provincial Department of Agriculture, it was learned from C. C. Aard, of Sackville, secretary-treasurer of the association, who was in the city today. It is present under supervision of the Department of Lands and Mines, but it is thought by the members of the organization that, as the foxes are now domesticated, fox ranching was a legitimate branch of agriculture as were stock raising undertakings and should be encouraged by the government.

SPEAKS OF OBJECTS

New Brunswick pelts last year, he said, brought the top price at the London sale and the aim of the association was to better advertise New Brunswick foxes and promote the sale of pelts, thus bringing into the country a considerable amount of outside money. Also it was the object of the association to promote the breeding of a better quality of foxes and help place the industry on a firm basis. There are about 250 fox ranches in the province and a like number in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Aard will leave tomorrow morning for Fredericton where he will appear before the government in regard to the proposed transfer.

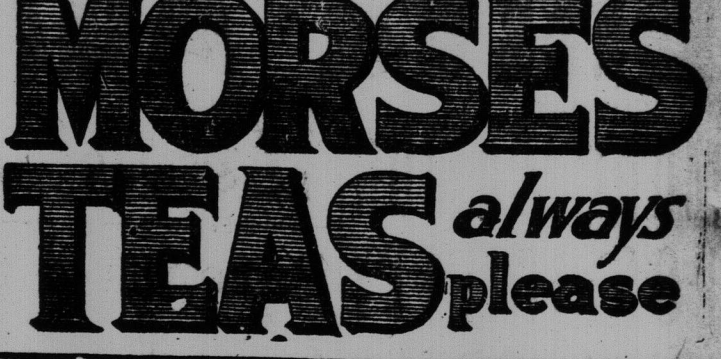
