## Dishes That Won't Break Are Sought In U. S. Federal Test

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—The American Hotel Association, restaurant keepers, and the United States Army have been gathering statistics on the cost of the breakage of their dishes. The results, now announced, indicate that doing business with crockery is expensive.

These figures show that dish destruction is one of the most costly items on the account of American hotels. One Eastern hotel of international repute spends \$80,000 annually for dishes and glassware to replace those broken. A Chicago hotel reports that it spends \$35,000 each year for imported chinaware alone. Hotel and restaurant managers say that they must allow for breakage of 20 per cent of their dishes each year. constructed that is capable of exerting a pressure of 100,000 pounds. It is so built as to smash pieces of the most resistant wire glass. A special pressure-measuring gauge keeps track of the power necessary in each case to break the glass. Apparatus contrived for determining the wind pressure on window glass may produce results of value to architects. The glass is subjected to water pressure so regulated that it duplicates the vagaries of strong winds. A kindred investigation conducted by the Bureau of Standards is a close study of milk bottles. In the manufacture of milk bottles needless expense is incurred under present conditions because of a lack of uniformity in sizes and markings required by the different States. To eliminate this source of waste the Bureau of Standards is testing various bottles to establish specifications for the container that best meets all requirements. These standards, when established, will be the result of scientific study and mutual agreement among manufacturers, dairymen and legislators.

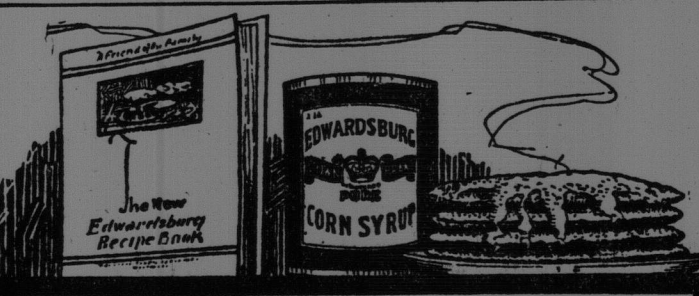

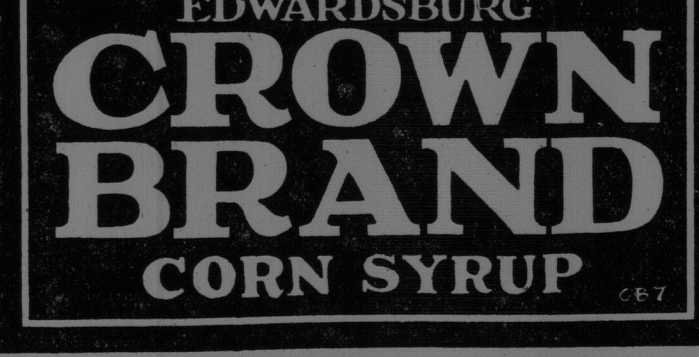

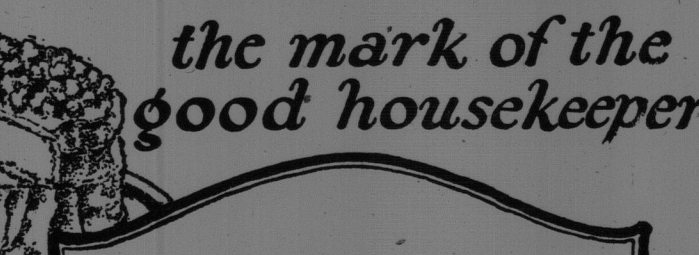

## DECIDES ON SALE OF CHRISTMAS SEALS

Saint John Society For Prevention of Tuberculosis Hopes For \$2,000.

The Saint John Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis will conduct a sale of Christmas seals again this year and at the meeting of the society yesterday all arrangements were made for beginning the sale in the last week in November.

The campaign is to have a double objective. It is to be educational first and then it is to be a drive for funds also. The financial objective this year is \$2,000.

A. M. Peters presided at yesterday's meeting which was the first since the summer months. Miss K. Bell, secretary, was appointed convener of the committee in charge of the sale of the Christmas seals and Mr. Peters was appointed to take charge of the publicity end of the educational campaign. Posters and material to be used in the campaign were shown at the meeting.

Arrangements were also made for the annual meeting which is to be held in the Health Centre on the evening of November 17. E. L. Rising and Fred Schofield were appointed to make all preparations in connection with the annual meeting.

The nurses' reports of the work done during the last four months showed that there had been an average of 800 visits, 15 cases X-rayed, 29 fluoroscopes and 80 examinations each month. Free clinics had been held each week with a large number of patients attending. The president voted the members' appreciation of the excellent work done and warmly congratulated the nurses on what they had been able to accomplish.

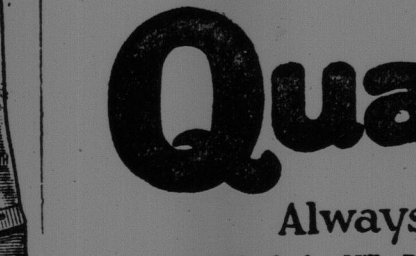
