## CANADA'S STATUS IN WORLD ASSURED

Prominent Part Played at  
Geneva Stressed by Sir  
Herbert Ames.

Many inner details of the working of the League of Nations were given the Montreal Rotary Club at their luncheon on Tuesday by Sir Herbert Ames, Financial Secretary of the League, in the course of an address on his five years' experience at Geneva. He emphasized the point that Canada had done her full duty throughout the war, and had also done her full duty in the ensuing peace by her adherence to the League of Nations, which had brought the Dominion her full share of the respect of the world.

As to the League of Nations itself, Sir Herbert spoke of it primarily from a financial point of view. For its successful work, he said, it was infinitesimal, while every expenditure was looked after with the most extraordinary care in auditing. Its work cost a total of between \$4,500,000 and \$5,000,000 a year, which was only an infinitesimal fraction of the cost of armaments by the nations, and about the cost of one well equipped British cruiser of the County class. Of this total, Canada contributed only \$165,000 a year, which he considered a small contribution compared with the standing of her membership gave the Dominion as one of the great family of nations working together to preserve the peace and amity of the world.

In return for this outlay, Sir Herbert said that the League gave the world an enormous service, as it had done on many occasions, in conserving the rights of minorities of many countries, in preserving liberties in mandated areas, in carrying on work in many lines through technical work, in social service, and especially in its work for the relief of prisoners of war and exiles.

It was almost exactly five years, said Sir Herbert, since he had received a letter from Sir Robert Borden, then Prime Minister of Canada, asking him to accept the position of Financial Director of the League of Nations. He had accepted, not by any loss of thought of the kindness of the people of St. Antoine division, but because he thought it opened a new vista for service. "And today, after five years of work with the League," added Sir Herbert, "I have no reason to regret the choice I then made."

Complete Organization. When he went to Geneva, said Sir Herbert, there was an organization in the making. Today it was a complete organization, with every part working well, and functioning in an international manner, with 54 nations co-operating in its work. An annual budget for its expenditures was made, and he remarked that no budget in the world was ever so criticized as that of the League of Nations, everything having to be done on the basis of the American dollar, since the United States was the only country that had kept its gold basis both during and after the war.

"Sometimes people in Canada wonder whether they get the worth of the \$165,000 a year their membership in the League of Nations costs," proceeded Sir Herbert. "I think I can show you that the work of the past five years was worth the effort. Canada occupies a unique position in the League, perhaps because our nearest neighbor does not take the same appreciative attitude. The fact is that Canada has not only done her bit throughout the whole war, but has also done her bit ever since the war." (Applause.)

Canada, he said, as a result of her loyal support of the League, was in a strong position at the meetings of the League, and today enjoyed the esteem of the whole world. Proceeding, Sir Herbert sketched the manifold activities of the League of Nations, and said he had never come in contact with any body in the world that was carried on with such rigid economy. He pointed out the number of wars that had been prevented by the work of the League, its work in the financial reconstruction of Austria and Hungary, and the work done to look after the Armenian refugees in Greece, as only part of its activities. In addition to this, he spoke of the work with regard to the stopping of the opium traffic and white slavery, as well as a multiplicity of other beneficent activities.

"That is the work we are taking our share in," concluded Sir Herbert. "I am returning to Europe on Saturday, and I shall return proud to be a Canadian. We have done our full share both during and since the war, and today a Canadian in Europe can look any man in the face and tell him he is a Canadian. I confidently predict that the day is coming when we shall get back a hundred-fold what we are spending on the League of Nations today. After all, there is such a thing as gratitude in the world, and the attitude taken by Canada towards those other nations who need help will be remembered for many years to come, both in a psychological and material way."

part to the diet, with a sparing quantity of meat. It will not do the least harm to give a dose of citrate of magnesia twice a week in the morning. One dessertspoonful is enough for a dog under twenty-five pounds and three for a fifty-pound dog.  
The main thing is the use of common sense. It is something that cannot be had in an overdose. The instant the dog shows signs of being ill, send for the best veterinary obtainable, just as one would send for the best physician for a child. The cry of "Mad dog!"—which, incidentally, is usually wrong—would not be heard so often if common sense were used. The thing to do is to study the wants of your dog—he cannot tell them to you—and make him just as comfortable in unbearable weather as you can. He is a loyal and real friend and is worth every bit of care and attention that you can give him.
