POINCARÉ PLANS LONDON VISIT Britain and France Together on German Finance

Downing Street Meeting on Situation—Times Writer Says Britain Holds Key—French Paper Urges European Nations to Cancel War Debts.

London, July 11—Great Britain and France are in close communication concerning Germany's financial position and the reparations question, and Premier Poincaré is said to plan coming to London soon for a conference with Premier Lloyd George.

The whole international financial situation came before the British cabinet at a meeting today, especially in its relation to the collapse of the German mark.
