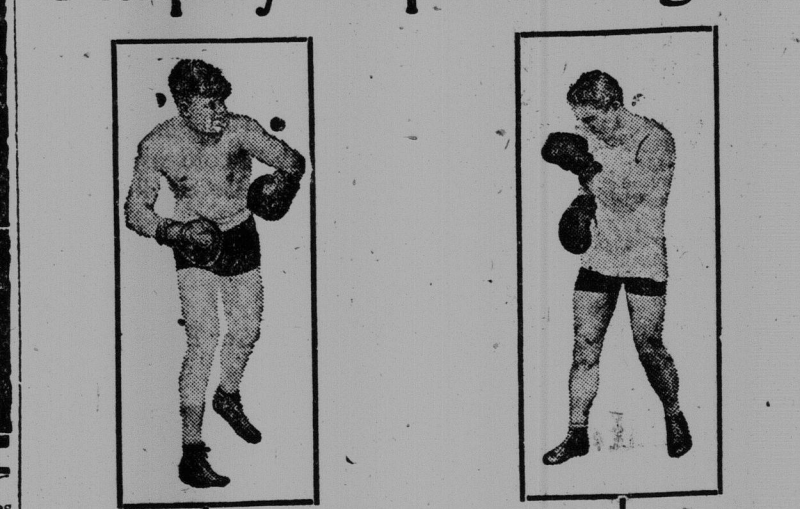

N. B. CHAMPIONS TO PLAY IN N. S.
New Glasgow, N. S., Aug. 12.—As the Nova Scotia tennis tournament, being played off on the courts of the Mayflower Club here, approached the semi-final stages today, a great improvement in speed and dash of play was in evidence in the various events. The match of the day was staged by C. R. Grant, veteran representative of the South End Club, Halifax, who defeated the brilliant young Bedford player, Jimmy Butler, 6-0, 6-0.

SCOTT HITS HOMER AT LAST
Gets First Circuit Clout in Nine Years at Fenwick Park.
Boston, Aug. 13.—Captain Everett Scott of the Red Sox realized an ambition of nine years' standing when he made his first home run at Fenway Park. Although Scott has played regu-

larly with the team for nine years and in more than 700 consecutive games, until this week he had failed to get a circuit drive on the local grounds. The hit was a long blow to right centre which rolled between Cobb and Heilmann and bounded against the fence.

MUNICIPAL GOLF CLUB SUCCESS IN EDMONTON
A. W. Haddon, city engineer of Edmonton, who is in charge of the municipal course there (the first established in Canada, nine years ago), reports that last season there were 642 tickets sold for 20 games at \$3; 2,396 tickets for single games at 35 cents; 52 men's season tickets at \$12.50; 12 ladies' season tickets at \$7.50; 7 boys' at \$4; 6 husband and wives at \$17.50; whilst 76 lockers were rented at \$1. This gives the very satisfactory revenue for the season of \$3,708. There are many small private clubs that do not boast a revenue greater than this of the Edmonton municipal course.

The fees for this season have been increased somewhat. They are: 20 games, \$4; men's season tickets, \$15; ladies, \$9; boys, age limit 14 years, \$5; "husband-wife," \$20.

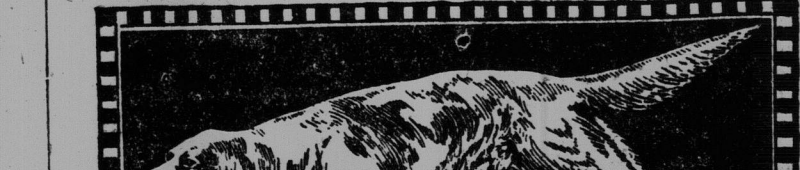
