Maritime Races
(Moncton Transcript)
In a write-up of the harness racing interests in the various centres of the maritime provinces, which he recently visited, Al H. Standish, of the American Horse Breeder staff, gives the following on the stables at Moncton:—
"Mr. Belliveau is the owner of Budget, 2,045; one Thomas W. Murphy's first string pacers last season, and purchased during the winter by the Moncton sportsman. The King Reo pacer is now in the stable of William Ingram, who also has in his charge the former Indiana-owned pacer Dan C. 2,045, by Newton Boy, 2,104 (sic of Possibility, 2,024, and Davus, 2,214), and the Peter the Great mare, Alice the Great, 2,243, also a yearling colt, an exceptionally promising youngster, out of Alice the Great and by the Bingen Stallion, La Copia, 2,094.
Another interesting stable at the Moncton track is that of Frank Boutillier, the Halifax, N. S., trainer, who is working the trotters, Brage, 2,163, by Baring, 2,124, and Davus, 2,214, by Baring. The pacer of the stable is the dependable Belmont Miller, 2,164, by Acquire (son of Arlin), 2,191, bred so successfully last season by Boutillier. Three green prospects of good pedigree complete the Boutillier roll call.
Trainer Peter Carroll also of Halifax is at Moncton, with the trotter Marshal M., Jr., 2,224, by Marshal M., (son of Bingen, 2,094), the Kuevers trotter Napoleon C., 2,194 (a winner last year at

Aylesford and Charlottetown) an unnamed four-year-old trotter by Captain Aubrey, 2,074 (son of Peter the Great, 2,074), and a green pacer.
The stable consists of the trotting mare, Victoria, 2,154, by Quindie; the pacing mare Jenny Penn, 2,187, by Willie Penn, 3,074, and two unmarketed prospects.
The John P. Smith stable, hailing from Charlottetown, P. E. I., also will get its training at Moncton, the star of the stable being the iron-sided Bingen pacing stallion, La Copia, 2,094, now in his thirteenth year.
Prince Rupert, 2,045, is another Moncton-owned pacer, and if care and condition count for anything the Prince Dillard pacer should be a factor in the maritime free-for-all, notwithstanding the fact that there are a lot of good top-class pacers ready to take the racing fast and furious. Prince Rupert is owned by D. W. Wilbur, and is taking his work from the home stable at present.

ANNUAL MEETING OF LUDLOW STREET CHURCH
At the 78th annual meeting of the Ludlow street Baptist church last evening, reports showed a prosperous year. Devotional exercises were led by the pastor, Rev. W. R. Robinson.
The clerk reported seventeen baptisms and four additions by letter and a loss of eight by deaths. The membership is 599. The treasurer reported received for general church work \$4,032.50, and a balance on hand of \$192.97. For the Sunday school there was reported a membership of 384 with twenty-four teachers and eleven officers; amount raised for all purposes, \$1,145.50. The senior B. Y. P.
