ST. JOHN Y. M. C. A. IN SECOND PLACE

The physical director of the local Y. M. C. A. has received the report of the final results of the international senior hexathlon contest for 1923. It states that 4,263 men, representing seventy-eight associations, from twenty-six states and seven provinces in Canada competed. This is a larger individual participation than in any previous year.

The championship winners were: Class "A"—Toronto, Ont. (West End). Class "B"—Stouffville (South Dakota). Class "C"—Richmond (Indiana).

A YOUTH, WANTED FOR MURDER, GIVES THRILLS TO POLICE

New York, March 19.—Billy Dietz, eighteen years old, who is wanted on a charge of murder, was arrested by four detectives early today after they had fired a dozen shots, shattered his arm with one bullet and cracked his chin bone with another, while he was attempting one floor down an outside wall, leaping across a court from window ledge to window ledge, and plunging from a fire escape to the pavement, two floors below. Young Dietz had been sought since February 25, when he was alleged to have shot and killed Daniel Fitzgerald, nineteen.

Russia To Tax All Foreigners

Levy of Eighty Per Cent. of All Salaries of More Than \$100 a Month.

(Canadian Pacific Cable.) Moscow, March 19.—The Government has decreed that all foreigners residing in Russia, with the exception of diplomats, consular officers and persons who have made special arrangements through their connections with a concession, are subject to the same taxes that are levied on the Russians. The present income tax takes eighty per cent. of all salaries of more than one hundred dollars monthly.

ROBBED AND CAFE TAKES FIRE WHILE HE IS UNCONSCIOUS

Peculiar Circumstances Surround Blaze in Windsor Hotel, Moncton, Today.

Moncton, N. B., March 19.—Fire which broke out in the kitchen of the Ross Cafe in the Windsor Hotel at seven a. m. badly gutted the cafe and several rooms of the hotel. F. B. Ross, proprietor, estimates his loss at about \$3,000.

Mr. Ross says that while he was washing his hands at a sink near the back door somebody shoved the door open and struck him, rendering him unconscious. While he was in this state a sum of money was taken from his pockets. It was reported that about \$350 was taken.

Ross says that there was no fire before he was attacked and that when he regained consciousness the building was afire.

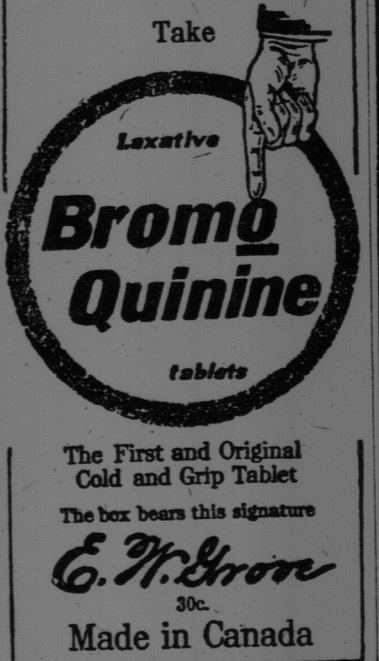

(Continued from page one) Commissioner Thornton said he wanted a guarantee in writing that the commission could supply the light then. The Mayor said the city could not afford to allow June 30 to pass.

F. S. A. McMullin said he thought all the responsibility in this connection should not be placed on the commission. It should be conditional. Commissioner Frink said under the legislation passed last winter the power company would be obliged to supply light.

The Mayor moved that the notification be sent to the power company and this was carried. The Mayor said a letter with reference to a meeting tomorrow to discuss the Workmen's Compensation Act.

Asphalt Tenders. Tenders for asphalt were opened and referred to the Commissioner of Public Works and the Road Engineer for report. 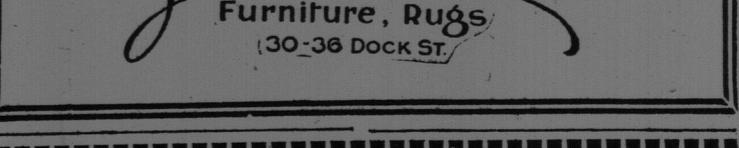

The Christian Chinese of the city are looking forward to the coming visit of one of the foremost Chinese missionary workers, Rev. Dr. William D. Noyse, secretary for Eastern Canada of Chinese missionary work. He was taken to China when about eight months old by his parents, both of whom were missionaries in that field, and himself spent about thirty years in that country. His knowledge of the language and dialects is equalled by few white men.

Dr. Noyse now has his headquarters in Toronto. The programme has not yet been completed for his visit, but it has been arranged for him to preach in Central Baptist Church on one Sunday.
