

The White Star liner Olympic, the largest passenger vessel in the world, which was badly damaged in a collision with the British warship Hawk in Southampton Roads, off the south coast of England. She had nearly 3,000 people on board. The force of the collision ripped a hole in her side, and compelled her to put back to Southampton and go into dry dock.

JUDGE RITCHIE THREATENS THE CHIEF OF POLICE WITH SEVEN DAYS IN THE JAIL

Lively Proceedings in Police Court Today Over the Sheet Presented to Court With List of Prisoners—Sharp Talk and it Ends There

In the police court this morning a very animated trial took place between Judge Ritchie and Chief Clark. It was so heated that His Honor threatened to send the chief into jail for seven days for contempt of court. The matter started through an error on the police sheet. The name of one of the prisoners, William Latimer, did not appear on the sheet, and the court told the sergeant to go below and have the matter rectified, remarking at the same time that the court would deal with the amended sheet next.

After a few minutes delay the chief appeared with the sheet and remarked to the judge that if there were any errors in the sheet that he was capable of attending to them. "Get right down stairs out of this," said His Honor, "and don't come around here interfering with the business of this court. You have no more right here than any of those spectators outside the hall."

"I came up here to see about my sheet and I went down, said the chief.

"If you don't, said the judge, I will send you into jail for seven days. Now you can either apologize or go to jail."

"Then take him in charge, said the judge to Policeman Goshine who is acting court sergeant. The chief ended matters there, by walking downstairs.

"Certainly this is a nice example for you to be setting for you men, added the judge as a parting shot, and the business of the court was resumed.

Herman Daley, William Peterson, John Wickham, Thomas Sharkey, George Holder and Catherine Gallagher were each fined \$2 or two months in jail on the charge of drunkenness. William Latimer, charged with assaulting his wife in a yard Westmorland road, was remanded to jail. Latimer is an old man and was in a pretty bad shape in court this morning. The court ordered that he be examined by a physician.

The case against Samuel J. Cohen, charged with keeping his factory in Dock street open on Sunday, September 19, was adjourned until Monday on account of more witnesses.

George Martin and David Guthrie were remanded on the charge of drunkenness.

The assault case of Haney vs. Haney and McCann was laid over until Monday morning at 10 o'clock in order to secure more witnesses.

Thomas Campbell, arrested on charge of being drunk in Brussels street last night and also on suspicion of having set fire to the J. McGillivray house, pleaded not guilty. Mrs. G. Olive, a tenant in the house, swore that she saw Campbell lighting matches in the cellar and also saw the fire after Campbell left the house. She said that she called out to him, but he ran away.

Alexander Chisholm,orman in No. 1 Jagger Co., told of seeing Campbell coming out of the house at the year of the Haney assault case. Instead of reading that Haney was admitted to bail it should have stated Ramsay.
