RECENT DEATHS

After an illness which lasted only two days, John Cruikshank, florist, of Lancaster heights, succumbed to an attack of pneumonia yesterday, aged eighty-two years. Mr. Cruikshank was one of the best known citizens of the west side and many hundreds there as well as all over the city will regret to learn of his sudden death. He was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, July 5, 1838, and while still a young man came to St. John as gardener with E. D. Jewett at his line residence in Carleton, which is now in use as the D.S.C.R. hospital. He remained there five years, leaving to accept the position of superintendent at Fernhill cemetery, which he filled with ability and success for sixteen years. At the end of that period Mr. Cruikshank bought the property in Lancaster heights, built the house in which he lived until his death, and started the florist business which became one of the leading ones in the city. For many years he was connected with the First Presbyterian church in Carleton as elder and for sixteen years he was the honored treasurer of the congregation. A man of few words, all who knew him were familiar with his probity and soundness of judgment and he will be a sore loss to the Presbyterian cause in his community. Mr. and Mrs. Cruikshank were married in Scotland and seven years ago celebrated their golden wedding. Besides his wife, who was Helen Craigie, he is survived by two sons, James C. of the C.N.R. mechanical staff, Moncton, and J. Percy, of the staff of T. McAvity & Sons, Limited. The brothers are House S. of Lancaster heights, and James and William, of Peterhead, Scotland; one sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Adams, of the same place, also survive. The funeral will be held from his late residence Lancaster heights on Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

James MacKenzie, Sr., at one time a resident of St. John, died recently at 204 Bowdoin street, Dorchester, Boston. His wife was formerly Miss Annie Connell, and she survives him, as does a daughter, Mrs. James Jesso.

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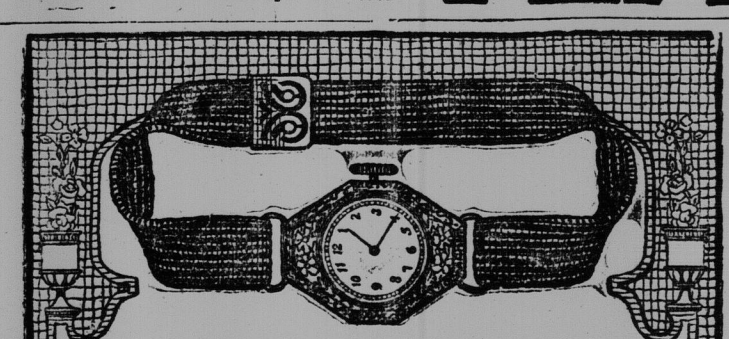

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MORNING NEWS

OVER THE WIRES

A strike of employees of the St. Lawrence Sugar Refinery, Montreal, ended yesterday when terms offered by the company were accepted.

An inquest into the finding of the body of a female child recently in the river above Milltown was held yesterday in St. Stephen. The jury brought in a verdict that it had not come to its death from natural causes and recommended a further investigation of the case by the authorities.

The Moncton city council last night accepted an offer of J. M. Robinson & Son of this city for \$180,000 worth of city bonds at 94 and \$200,000 twenty-year bonds at 92.33. Both are six per cent issues.

A German fishing rod brought home by Charles McKinnon of Sydney, N. S., was loaned yesterday to Neville Brennan, aged fourteen years. When he started to rig it for fishing it exploded, seriously injuring him. Examination later showed that the rod was filled with high explosive.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

At the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in Ottawa yesterday it was decided to divide the million dollars, the excess subscriptions in the forward movement financial drive, pro rata amongst the causes provided for in the four million drive. It was recommended by John Patterson, K. C., of Toronto, that the salaries of the treasurer of the church, the secretaries of the board of home missions and social service, foreign missions, Sabbath school and young people's societies and the editor of Presbyterian publications, be increased. This motion was not passed at this session because of the desire of the assembly to raise the minimum salaries of the ministers of the church. Other routine business was transacted.

ITALIANS LOSE

IN BRUSH WITH ALBANIAN

Rome, June 9—Albanian insurgents have occupied the villages of Postrova and Selitza in Albania, according to advices yesterday. The Italian forces retired in the direction of Valona. A torpedo boat lying off Valona protected the Italian troops, who are believed to have lost many men.
