not be lawful. This, of course, is an extraordinary power placed in the hands of the Provincial Board of Health for the protection of the health of the citizens; but it is not for me to discuss the wisdom of the legislature in passing such a statute; it has been passed, and all we can do is to obey it, and it must be obeyed, whether the council or the commissioners manage the works, otherwise the acts of the council or commissioners would be unlawful and very serious loss might be occasioned to the public and to the corporation, if an accident should occur while the water is being unlawfully supplied.

"If the waterworks be established "If the waterworks be established according to law so that the supply of water be lawful then section 25 of The Waterworks Act expressly provides that the corporation of the municipality shall not be liable for damages caused by the breaking of any service pipes or attachment, or for any shutting off of any water to repair mains or to tap the mains, and the common law provides many other exemptions from liability when the commissioners or council carry on a lawful work, but while they are doing an unlawful work they have not the same protection.
