The part of the bill relating to labor, and which comes under the head of new legislation, empowers any police officer above the rank of sergeant, when he has any reasonable ground to believe that any building sergeant, when he has any reasonable ground to believe that any building or place is being used for a meeting for instigating or aiding in a continuance of a strike, to enter such building by breaking open doors, etc., and seize any documents which he may reasonably suspect relate to such lockout, etc. A meeting of two or more persons assembled for the foregoing purposes, etc., shall be declared unlawful. Any person taking part in such meeting, who has reason to believe that the probable consequences of such lockout, etc., will be to deprive the public, either wholly or to a great extent, of the supply of a necessary commodity, shall be liable to imprisonment for twelve months. The bill, in full, is on file in the bureau of manufacturers. eau of manufacturers.
