

To Protect German Sugar. UNION FORMED FOR DEFENCE AGAINST

A UNION FORMED FOR DEFENCE AGAINST THE NEW AMERICAN TARIPF. [By Cable to the Hernid.] Berlin, Sept. 2, 1894.—Representatives of the German sugar interests met yester-day in Kroll's Garden and resolved to form a protective union. They voted also that the union should adopt such measures as would save the beet sugar industry of Ger-many and allied industries from killing competition or hostile legislation. A deputation called upon Freiherr Mar-schall von Bleberstein, Caprivi's representa-tive, and submitted a petition for govern-ment protection of the beet sugar industry against the new American tariff. Just what kind of protection they expect the sugar men neglected to say.
