Their Excellencies and party were met by Mayor Fullerton and the City Council and a detachment of the 94th Argyle Highlanders, who acted as a guard of honor. The landing was greeted by a salute from the French warships Troude and Chassloup Laubat and the 17th Field Battery. The party were then conveyed to Victoria Park, where His Worship Mayor Fullerton, on behalf of the city, presented His Excellency with an address of welcome.
