The resolution is the out-come of an enquiry made recently by a commission of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and lays par-ticular stress upon the training of the women. It recognizes that higher technical training is being looked after fairly well at present, but that throughout the Dominion there is practically no provision for technical education which will reach the women. The Canadian Manufacturers' Association are asking the co-operation of Boards of Trade all over Canada in pressing on the attention of the federal government the great necessity for this intermediate technical training.
