PANIC AT CASABLANCA; ALL EUROPEANS LEAVING

Situation There is Steadily Growing Worse Spain and France Sending Troops to Protect Citizens of All Nations and Punish the Guilty

TANGIER, Morocco, Aug. 3.—The situation at Casablanca grows steadily worse. Two steamers arrived here today, bringing refugees, the Constantine and the Galleon. All the Europeans at Casablanca have been taken aboard the steamers anchored in the harbor, and panic reigns in the town.

TANGIER, Aug. 3.—Another steamer has arrived here, bringing a number of refugees from Casablanca. These refugees were not permitted to leave the town in peace. In spite of the presence of the French cruiser Galleon, the Europeans as they were embarking were subjected to a series of reprisals, for they desisted and proceeded to the Christian cemetery, dragged out the bodies of the dead and buried them.

TANGIER, Aug. 3.—A semi-official note issued here today announces that in view of the absolute powerlessness of the Moroccan government to repress the lawless actions of the tribesmen of the Moroccan coast, the French government has decided to send troops to Casablanca to maintain the security of all citizens of all nations and the punishment of the guilty.

ORAN, Algeria, Aug. 3.—French troops are being massed here and at points in the interior in readiness to embark for Morocco. The French consuls here at Oran and Algiers are sending reinforcements from Algeria before landing.

WOLFFVILLE, N. S., Aug. 4.—Rev. Dr. Sawyer, ex-president of Acadia University, and professor of philosophy at that institution, is dangerously ill at his home here and it is feared that he may not recover. His son, Prof. E. W. Sawyer, who is at present president of the University of New Brunswick, is in the city.

A DISASTROUS FIRE. MONTREAL, Aug. 4.—A disastrous fire occurred at Saint-Henri Junction, about 20 miles from here, on Saturday, which resulted in the destruction of a large factory belonging to the Dominion Furniture Company, and the Junction Hotel, entailing a total loss of over \$100,000.

WHITE'S AND BLACKS IN SAVAGE FIGHT

At Least Five Thousand Persons Engaged—Two May Die—Others Seriously Injured. NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—The fighting between the whites and blacks in the vicinity of 125th street and Fifth avenue lined up according to their racial prejudices again today, this time to settle a baseball dispute—and when the argument was ended fifty persons required medical treatment, and of that number two may die before morning.

Probably five thousand persons took part in the fight, but the 500 policemen who dispersed the mob after everyone was fought out, got only nine prisoners, and of these two were women. John McCue, a truck driver, 32 years old, and Matthew Murtha, aged 35 years, an ice peddler, received fractured skulls and were removed to a hospital in a dying condition.

ITALY'S KING TO VISIT ENGLAND THIS SUMMER Will be the Guest of Edward VII Before the Arrival of the Kaiser. LONDON, Aug. 3.—King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Elena are coming to England this summer to return to the King Edward's visit to Gaeta.

BRITISH JOURNALISTS REACHED VANCOUVER SUNDAY MORNING VANCOUVER, Aug. 4.—The British journalists visiting Canada as the guests of the C. P. R. reached here this morning and were met by Mr. Marpole and E. J. Coyle of the C. P. R. at the station.

COBALT, Aug. 3.—Early this morning a fatal accident occurred in the Temiskaming and Hudson's Bay mine. Alexander McLean was coming up the shaft in a bucket with a fellow miner and safely reached the top, but on getting out of the bucket slipped and fell down into the gulping hole below, which is 70 feet deep.
