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TOWN COUNCIL HOLDS REGULAR MEETING

A meeting of the Town Council was held on Thursday evening with Councillor T. M. Richards in the Chair in the absence of the Mayor.

The usual routine business was transacted.

A petition was received asking that the electric light system be extended some distance out the St. Hilaire road and it was decided that if a sufficient number of users could be guaranteed the system would be extended as requested.

The application of H. S. Franklin for the position of Electrical Superintendent was considered but no action was taken thereon.

The report of the Town Solicitor on the bylaws of the Town was received and considered. A committee consisting of the Town Clerk, the Chief of Police and the Town Solicitor was appointed to revise the Town bylaws and make necessary additions thereto.

The Town Clerk presented a detailed statement of capital expenditure in connection with the reconditioning of the electrical system. According to this report the sum of 10,700.00 has been expended on the building of the operators' houses. It is estimated that \$1500 will completely finish and equip the houses so that the total cost will be \$12,200.00.

MARTIN HALL WINS FRANCHETTI CUP

The finals in the play for the Franchetti Cup emblematic of the handicap championship of the Edmundston Golf Club were played on Labor day between Mr. John F. McKenzie and Mr. Martin I. Hall, the match and cup being won by the latter.

The match consisted of eighteen holes and as both players had the same handicap they played from scratch. Mr. Hall played the best golf of his career during the first round and turned in the best score that has ever been made on the course in championship play. Mr. McKenzie played excellent golf during the whole match but could not cope with his opponent's championship form. In that round Hall made a score of 37 to McKenzie's 42 and finished 3 up.

In the second round McKenzie won the first hole, halved the second, and won the third and fourth to square the match. Hall however, won the fifth and sixth holes and halved the seventh and eighth winning the match two up and one to go. McKenzie's score for the eight holes in the second round was 36 to Hall's 37. Their score for the match by holes were as follows:

The draw has been made for the play for the Smiley Cup, which was donated by Mr. L. C. Smiley, and the qualifying round will be played on Saturday.

The Franchetti Cup was donated by Rev. N. Franchetti and was won last year by Robert Hunter.

SENTENCED UNDER N. B. LIQUOR ACT

Police Magistrate E. J. Hubert gave his decision in the case of The King vs Henry Ouellette on Tuesday morning. This case involved a charge of being in charge of a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor. Mr. A. J. Dionne, acting for the accused, contended that the state in which he was found by the Provincial Police was due to the condition of his heart and not liquor, and substantiated the statement by the evidence of Dr. A. M. Sorany and others. The magistrate, however, found the accused guilty and sentenced him to seven days in the common goal. Mr. A. M. Chamberland, of Grand Falls, appeared for the Crown.

In the Police Court on Tuesday morning Mr. Auguste Verrette pleaded guilty of the charge of having liquor in his possession unlawfully and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$100.00 and to spend two months in goal.
