DEFEATED

LEDBETTER

There was a large crowd at the
Victoria rink last night who were
delighted with an excellent exhibition
of speed skating between Hilton Bel-
lea and Ledbetter of Westville in a
series of three races. The ice was in
the best of condition for fast skating
and the two men made the most of
it.

The first race was to have been 440
yards, but the skaters agreed to have
it a match for four laps. At the
crack of the revolver Ledbetter, who
is a quicker starter than Belyea, gained
quite a lead, but the strong steady
stroke of the St. John man soon closed
up the lead and on the third lap
they were almost tied. The two men,
who started from opposite sides of the
rink, finished at the same time, four
timers catching them at 45 seconds,
and the race was decided a tie.

The rink record for 440 yards is 38 1-5
seconds.

The second race was a half mile
from opposite sides and at the start
Ledbetter once more got an advan-
tage and for about four laps he had
a slight lead but by this time Belyea
evened matters with him and slowly
forced into the lead and won the race
handily, his time being 1:24.

It was plainly seen that Ledbetter
hadn't the staying powers of the St.
John man and in the third race, which
was for a mile, it was easily the opin-
ion that the West Ender would be the
winner. Like the two previous races,
the Nova Scotia lead for a few laps,
but could not stand the pace. Belyea
gradually forged into the lead and
easily won the event without much
trouble. His time for the mile was
3:01. The first half of the mile was
skated in 1:27.

Belyea has defeated all comers here
so far this season and as Ledbetter
is the champion of Nova Scotia, the
winning of last night's series practi-
cally gives Belyea the championship
of the Maritime Provinces.

James Pullen, and F. E. Williams;
timers, Fred Logan, J. Pullen and W.
