## BILL TO AMEND PAVING ACT AGREED TO

House met at 3.20 p. m. Mr. Munro presented the report of the municipalities committee.

Mr. Slipp presented report of corporations committee.

Mr. Guthrie presented a petition in favor of a bill to incorporate the La Cie D'imprimerie De Madawaska.

## NOTICES OF INQUIRY.

Mr. Dugal gave the following notices of inquiry with regard to amount of roads taxes collected and paid into treasury of each municipality.

As to pay of parish road supervisors and whether county engineers and highway engineers were appointed; how many road graders were purchased from the American Road Machine Company of Canada by the Department of Public Works; as to the construction of the Bellville bridge, Acadiaville, Kent County; as to information regarding the construction of Church bridge, Acadiaville, Kent County; as to amount paid by the Department of Public Works for work done upon roads, and bridges and to highway engineers and supervisors between October 31st and November 30th, 1913; as to the number of days of work performed by A. C. Flemming during fiscal year 1913-14; how much the government paid for paid for other material used in connection with the paving and cleaning of steel bridges; whether the Quebec and St. John Railway Company has applied for further assistance from the province to construct the Valley Railway; as to the letter sent by the superintendent of the provincial hospital relative to the charge of \$1 per week for patients not supported by relatives; as to assurance given by the government to delegate member of the government to delegation from Parishes of Kingston and Westfield with regard to diverting the route of the Valley Railway so as to cross the Kennebecs at or near Barlow's Bluff and other information.

The law committee met this morning and decided to recommend bill from St. John to amend the municipalities Act. A provision was made whereby assessors must file the voters' list with the parish clerk within ten days after completing of rolls. The municipality of St. John was given authority to make an allowance for councilors not to exceed \$100 per annum in lieu of mileage and other perquisites.

Provision was also made for the appointment of a fourth assessor in the Parish of Lancaster. The committee also took up the consideration of a bill regarding the extension of the St. John Street Railway Co. and confirmed agreement therein except where it removed control of fares, etc., from the Public Utilities Commission. This bill was under consideration when the committee adjourned.

## SEVERAL CHANGES IN LIQUOR LAW RECOMMENDED

The report of the executive was then considered. The executive had decided that it would not have a delegation go before the government to ask for prohibition, but would ask the provincial government to take over the enforcement of the Scott Act. This was referred back to the committee.

## AMENDMENTS TO LIQUOR LAW.

The executive also reported that they would ask the government to amend several sections of the liquor license law. The amendments were submitted to the meeting as follows:

1. To have the funds collected in the different sections amalgamated into one fund.
2. To allow inspectors to seize liquor in railway stations in prohibitory territory, or while it was in transit on the highway.
3. To allow inspectors to retain another lawyer should the county clerk be engaged at the time in which the case was to come up.
4. To make it compulsory on a person arrested for being intoxicated to inform the authorities where he obtained liquor; failure of information to bring the penalty of imprisonment.
5. To allow action to be brought against wholesale dealers, and heavy fines imposed for shipping liquor in the prohibitory territory.
6. To allow an inspector or police officer to destroy liquor shipped into prohibitory territory for which no owner can be found.
7. To allow heavy fines to be imposed upon wholesalers for sending liquor under false colors, such as labeling them "groceries."
8. To allow heavy fines to be imposed upon wholesalers for sending liquor into prohibitory territory to notorious persons.

The first suggestion was referred back to the executive and the others were confirmed.

The executive also urged that friends of the Alliance should meet together for election of officers at times have been obliged to use the telephone booths placed in the train shed of the Union Depot.
