FOURTEEN ENLIST
AT FINE MEETING
AT NEWCASTLE

Sgt. Knight, one of the speakers, stirs large audience by forceful address

Newcastle, Sept. 18.—Jas. G. MacDonald, Stafford McCormick, Wm. Adair, J. Harry King, Edward Giltz, Joseph Hubbard, Peter Wilks and Hans Breen (Russians), Clarence Wright, Harry Perry, Joseph Fitzpatrick, Joseph Gallish, Thomas Matheson and Thomas Coughlan volunteered for the front after stirring addresses by Mayor G. G. Stohart, Rev. S. J. MacArthur, and Sgt. Norman Knight, of the 1st Gordon Highlanders.

Sgt. Knight talked straight on the war. He had two brothers in the war and he himself was going back to the trenches as soon as possible. He could not understand why New Brunswick was so backward in volunteering.

At the end of his address 14 men came forward. The other speakers were vigorous. After Sgt. Knight spoke Rev. Mr. C. J. Chodor, a Swedish reservist, was called upon, and told the audience that Canada's defence was in the trenches of Flanders. He believed in conscription. It was the safety of Sweden.

Fred C. Morrill had been appointed chief of police and Scott Act inspector, succeeding W. O. Chamberlain, who left and went to Bathurst to run a hotel. Mr. Morrill has had two years' experience on the Vancouver police force. He promises to enforce the Scott Act and offer to resign in two months if the committee are not satisfied with his efforts.
