## RESOLUTIONS OCCUPIED THE ATTENTION OF UNITED FARMERS

Convention Goes on Record Against Unjust Freight Rates and Against Issuing of Passes—Want Reciprocity With United States and Free Entry of Farm Implements.

**REPORT TO THE STANDARD**  
Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 26.—Resolutions occupied the attention of the United Farmers of New Brunswick in convention here this afternoon. Discussion upon them was varied and lengthy. The convention, on motion duly carried, to pay up the deficit of \$1,000 by means of a contribution of \$500 each made by each of new members.

The convention passed a resolution against unjust freight rates and against issuing of passes—want reciprocity with United States and free entry of farm implements.

Washington, Feb. 26.—President Hartley's proposal to submit to the United States Senate the memorandum submitted to the State Department relating to the negotiation of the four-power Pacific Islands treaty is likely to prove the prelude to an extended investigation in the Foreign Relations Committee before the Senate is permitted to be reported to the Senate.

The proposal is to report to the Senate the memorandum, and the committee will be requested to report to the Senate a bill to implement the memorandum.

The convention passed a resolution against the fact that an efficient system of compulsory education exists in the place of the local school system in regard to the more equitable method of school assessment of private funds to be devoted to the financial system of administration of rural school system be adopted.

Judson Corry said that the cost of education in some rural districts was almost prohibitive. Every dollar spent in public expenses must pay its share in the taxes levied on property in case of non-payment of taxes.

The convention, while it did not accept the resolution, did not disapprove of the recommendations of the education committee for returning, but was again presented and passed by the resolution. C. P. Alward emphasized the need of consolidation of power districts.

Mrs. Charles J. Roberts strongly supported compulsory education.
