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Sauble River. North to Chief's Point of any value, as there are no fishing grounds, and no fish there, and also for some distance south of Sauble River the same may be said, which leaves but little more than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles of actual fishing grounds, and which is altogether insufficient for the crowd of Indians who fish there. There are upwards of 350 Indians crowded into this narrow space. They used to extend their operations further south before the white men came there.

These white-men have unlimited grounds elsewhere, where they fish all the year round, except this short season, and it seems a pity they should be permitted to interfere with what has been considered from time immemorial Indian fishing grounds.

I have only further to add that the Indians have seriously contemplated the taking the law into their own hands and preventing these white men trespassing on their lands, and without this trespassing they cannot fish there.

I hope the subject will be taken into consideration on behalf of the Indians. I have the honor to be,
