

# FROM ALL OVER THE MARITIME PROVINCES

## FREDERICTON.

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 21.—(Special).—Letters patent have been issued by the governor in council incorporating S. H. White, W. J. Mills and H. P. Robinson of Sussex; Dr. W. W. White, and John E. Moore of St. John; and the S. H. White Company, Limited, with a capital stock of \$250,000. The object is to carry on the lumbering business in all the provinces, and also general mercantile and trading business.

Supplementary letters patent have been issued increasing the capital stock of the Sussex Exhibition and Driving Park Company from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

H. H. Dryden, George W. Fowler, M. P., George H. White, Jr., Chas. W. Short, of Sussex, and James L. McAvity of St. John, are seeking incorporation as H. H. Dryden, Limited. The object is to acquire and carry on the hardware business in all the provinces. The amount of the capital stock is \$40,000.

The announcement made by Solicitor General Jones in his speech on the budget this afternoon that the Harbord bridge would be made free at the close of the present session will be pleasing news to the people of Carleton county. There has been Mr. Jones' lobby ever since he entered the legislature, and he has been most persistent in pressing the matter upon the government.

The Fredericton Boat Company's bill to provide for an increase of tolls to be levied on the corporations committee of the legislature tomorrow morning. A delegation of lumbermen composed of J. Fraser Gregory, John E. Moore, Fred Beatty, Henry Hilyard and Charles Miller are here to lobby against it and load lumbermen will join them in the fight.

The civic election on March 12th will be held with a small voting list. There will be only about 800 names on the list this year while last year there were about 1,000. Mayor McNally stated for election, and Adm. Stockwell is also in the field. There has been some talk lately of there being a three-cornered fight, the name of J. D. Phinney, K. C., having been mentioned.

In the aldermanic contest Adm. Mitchell and W. J. Osborne are forming a ticket in Wellington ward, and another ticket is being formed with ex-Ald. John Scott and W. S. Hooper as the candidates. In St. Ann's ward the candidates now in the field are Ald. W. H. McGinn, Ald. Everett and Cornelius Kelly. Ald. Carleton and the other candidates are Ald. J. D. Hanlon and ex-Ald. John MacCallum. Ald. Mackenzie is in the field in St. Ann's ward. Ald. John Moore and Recorder Thomas Colter, in Kings ward the present representatives are Mr. Barbour and Chestnut, will be in the field once more, while other candidates are ex-Ald. Boyce and the other White and Alexander and Harold Edgcombe, delegates of the University of New Brunswick Y. M. C. A. to the world's conference at Nashville (Tenn.) March 1st.

H. M. Campbell has purchased the J. W. Tabor residence for \$3,000. The high standing committee of the Independent Order of Foresters held a meeting today.
