

**BUILDING TARIFF SUITS TORIES**

**The Likelihood of Their Making Any Changes for Some Time**

**Allows Government to Reduce Abolish Duties and Have Parliament Confirm Its Action, But There is Little Chance of Them Aiding Their Friends in Saskatchewan Contest.**

May 10—There will be no tariff changes before the budget speech is delivered next session. This is certain in reports in leading government organs as changes are now being considered, and are likely to be announced in the provincial election in Saskatchewan.

The government desires it can repeal the tariff on almost any article and parliament confirm its action next session. There is a special provision in enabling the government to grant a drawback on articles brought in by factors for their business, and authorizing tariff reductions on unusual conditions, such as a coal strike.

**PROPOSE TO HAVE THREE COALING PLANTS IN NEW BRUNSWICK**

Montreal, May 10—The commissioners of the National Trans-continental Railway have prepared plans for the construction of six 250-ton mechanical coaling plants with sand houses and track appliances at the following points: N. Moncton, N. B.; Napadogan, N. Brunswick; St. John's, N. Brunswick; and Armstrong, Ont. A 1,000-ton coaling station with inclined trestle is also planned for Cochrane.

Plans for all these plants are now being prepared.

**RICHESON'S LAST HOPE SHATTERED**

**Alienists Report Him to Be Sane Will Be Electrocuted for His Crime Some Time Next Week**

Brain Experts Find Murderer is Insane at Times, and That It is Hereditary, But the Former Pastor Was in Sound Mind When He Killed Avis Linnell, and is at the Present Time.

Canadian Press. Boston, May 16—Clarence V. T. Richeson's last hope of escaping the death chair was shattered tonight, when Governor Fish announced that he would not refer Richeson's petition for commutation of sentence to the executive council.

The statement from the governor followed closely the filing of the reports of the special insanity commission which declared the condemned man sane, although subject to fits of hysterical insanity. The commission found that Richeson was sane at the time of the murder and that he is sane at the present time.

In the death chamber at Charlestown the prisoner has borne himself calmly since he was transferred from the Charles street jail Tuesday. It was apparent that he still had hopes that clemency would be extended to him, and it was believed today that this hope was keeping up his spirits.

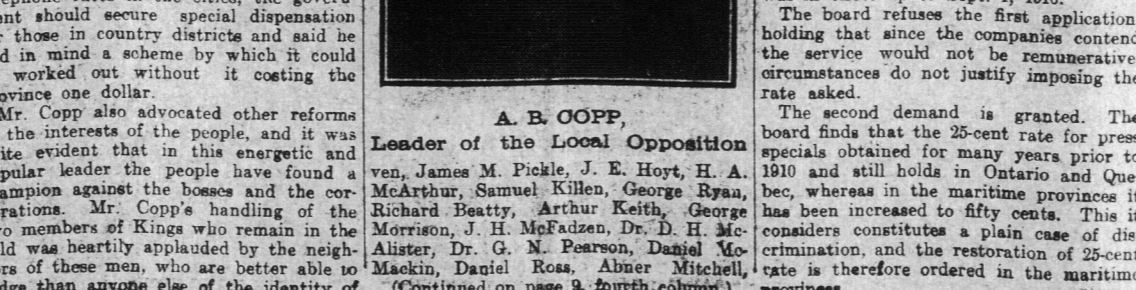
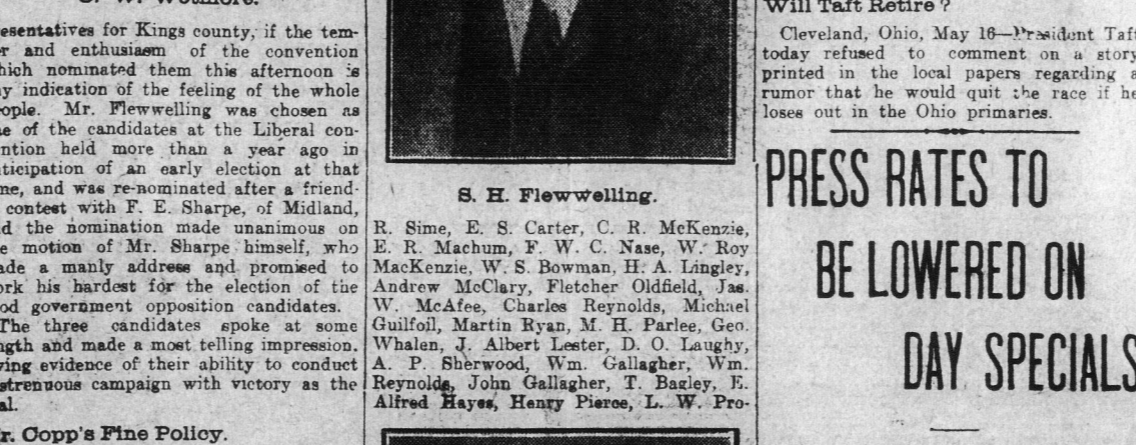

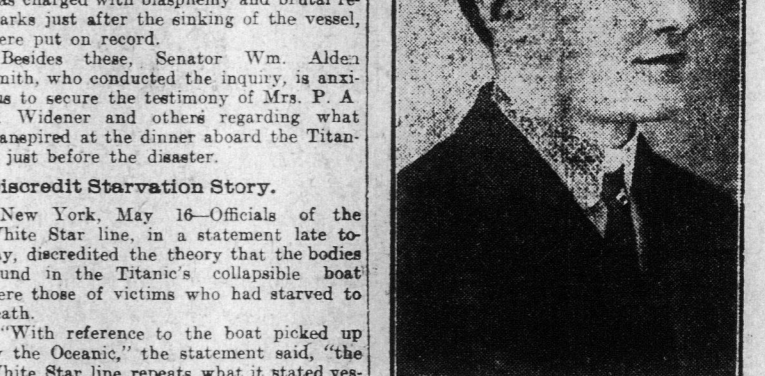
