front of the enemy's parapet by a twelve feet wide. Both officers and the ditch, which was shoulder high water, and a telephone wire was strung with barbed wire. Efforts were made to overcome this obstacle but with success.

The German trenches were then bombarded from positions close to the ditch, and casualties among the enemy were party returned safely to our trenches.

The 7th Battalion party, consisting of brigade commanders under Captain C. T. Corrigan, officers under Lieutenant MacLachlan, and Lieutenants MacLachlan, reached the enemy's parapet unobserved, under cover of a heavy rainstorm, and entered his trenches. A telephone wire was strung with the party, and touch was maintained throughout with Lieutenant Colonel Odom, in our front trenches. The party bombed its way down German trenches and communicating trenches. Many German soldiers were killed or killed by bombs in their dugouts. Twelve prisoners were taken.

Our objective having been achieved, our party was then recalled by prearranged signals, and returned to its trenches with its prisoners. Our casualties were one accidentally killed and one wounded.

During the above operation our artillery prevented the enemy in adjoining trenches from rendering assistance at the front of the attack. On the return of our party, our artillery shelled heavily the German front line trenches and all roads, and communicating trenches along the front line. The enemy's artillery was weak. The prisoners taken afforded valuable information as to the composition of the forces opposing us. In anticipation of an attack the enemy had manned trenches, thereby affording our party an exceptional opportunity for taking prisoners, and inflicting losses.

Field Marshal Sir John French sent a message congratulating our troops on a success of this enterprise. The health and spirits of our troops main excellent.

The incident recorded above was given place of honor in an official despatch on Sir John French himself to the War Office on Thursday evening last, published in The Telegraph of Friday, November 26.

"A successful enterprise was carried out by a small party of our troops the night of Nov. 16-17, with a loss of one man killed and one wounded, just north of the River Donavon, southwest of Messines. They forced an entrance into the enemy's front trenches, after bayonetting thirty of the occupants. The party returned with the following prisoners: killed and one slightly wounded, and bringing with them 12 German prisoners. This is the incident which the enemy reports as the repulse of a surprise attack on the Messines-Argenteuil road."

Reference to a map the exact whereabouts of the Canadian Army Corps, including the 28th battalion, can be determined.

12. Packages of tobacco and cigarettes are only sent to Canadian soldiers on active service; not to those in England or in Canada.

13. Packages may also be sent to the British army, the British army or the Belgian army, but in the case of Belgian soldiers it is impossible to make delivery of individuals.

14. Money received for the tobacco and should be paid in, at least twice a month, to either the Bank of Montreal, the Canadian Bank of Commerce, the Bank of Canada, the Dominion Bank, the Bank of Hamilton, the Bank of Toronto, the Bank of Nova Scotia, the Bank of Ottawa or the Northern Bank Bank, together with a list of contributors with names and addresses written legibly in order that the post cards may be correctly addressed.
