DECISION OF MR. JUSTICE SMITH IN THE CASE OF THE ST. AL. BANS RAIDERS YESTERDAY.

No. 29.

This act was called robbery by the applicants in the case, and was so denominated by the laws of Vermont and those of the United States, and hence fell under the action of the Ex. and hence fell under the action of the Eztradition Treaty; and all that remained for the carrying out of the treaty in this case was for the applicants to show proof that they had a claim for the surrender of

the prisoners. But the prisoners, on their part, said, this act of theirs was not one of robbery in the eye of the law : for the animus furandi was wanting, and the action of taking the noncy was simply one part of an act of war performed by them on the 19th of October at St. Albans, and, hence, could not come under the provisions of the Extradition Treaty.

The points of law involved in the con could be reduced to a few.

First, The municipal law says the act is one of robbery, but, in answer, the prisoners say, by their being belligerents, the essence of an act of robbery is lost, and consequently it ocases to come under the jur-isdiction of this court.
