### At the Market

There was a good attendance of both farmers and citizens at the market this morning. Eggs sold at 38 cents a dozen and butter at 48 cents a pound. Potatoes sold at \$1.20 and \$1.25 a bag. Apples were scarce, selling at 30 to 40 and 50 cents a basket. Beef by the quarter sold at 18 and 19 cents a lb. Pork sold for 27 and 28 cents. Wood sold for six dollars a half cord. Several small pigs were sold, the prices varying from seven to eleven dollars each. Extracted honey sold at 27 cents a pound.

### Ladies' Aid Zion Church

The Ladies' Aid of Zion Church has closed another successful year. During the year we continued our work of visiting, and distribution of tangible tokens of sympathy among the tried and needy.

We made 144 quilts and 8 comforters, besides much odd sewing, for the Red Cross, and special sewing for the Orphanage.

We have also supported a Bible Woman in Japan, and contributed other amounts for missions.

Several new members were added to our organization, bringing our present membership to 108.
