Billy Miller's Win In Southern State

Billy Miller Los Angeles wrestling fame, local friends will be pleased to note is keeping on. The following account of his wrestling match on the 24th ult. will be interesting.

"Miller made the early part of the match a standing one, grabbing and hauling away at Mike's neck in an apparent effort to create weakness on Michael's part. The bout started at 9 o'clock.

The men had been working an hour 19 minutes and 26 seconds. Dean Cromwell, eminent coach of the University of Southern California took a new hitch on his seat at the ringside and averred that it looked like a long night.

Just then something happened. Miller's feet flew into the air as Yokel clamped on a head chancery and jammed Walter's neck down into his chest. Miller's shoulder tips momentarily rested on the floor and Referee George Ketter signaled that Yokel had won the first fall.

The fall was spectacular and not so easy to explain. Betzer said afterward that he figured Yokel had somewhat of a crotch hold combined with the chancery.

In any event Miller apparently was helpless. Mike from behind had Miller's head doubled up like a jack knife half closed. He might have held him there for a week.

Throughout the first bout Yokel displayed more speed than he has in his previous two matches here. Miller repeatedly broke away from him and Mike darted after him in speedy fashion. Evidently recent wrestling has improved the Oklahoma man's quickness.

Miller kept away from the floor for a long while refusing Mike's efforts to draw him down.

Resting ten minutes, the boys came back for the second bout. It looked again as though Yokel was the superior but in 46 minutes and 45 seconds Miller secured a half Nelson, a body hold and a fall.

It required but 21 minutes and four seconds for Miller to win the last fall with a head scissor.

A wrestler who sat at the ringside declared that if Miller should win last night he undoubtedly had no known equal to his weight. It must be remembered that Yokel weighed about 10 pounds more than Miller.

On March 6th Billy will box K.O. Smith for the championship.

DATES ARRANGED FOR O.H.A. FINALS

Volunteer Army of Cossacks Pursue Remnants of Routed Bolshevik Forces.

EKATERINODAR, Russia, Feb. 22.—(Delayed)—The volunteer army of Kuban Cossacks, which made a clean sweep of the Bolsheviks in the Northern Caucasus continues the pursuit of the remnants of the Bolshevik force. The Bolsheviks scattered in all directions after the capture by the Cossacks of Vladikavkaz.

Further details have been learned of the manner in which the Bolshevik last December killed more than 100 prominent hostages, including Generals Rushki and Yadko Dimitrieff, of the Russian army and several women. The hostages were taken in motor trucks to Piatigorsk, southwest of Georgievsk, and placed against a cliff where they were shot down with machine guns by Bolshevik snipers.

Those who showed signs of life when the machine ceased firing were hacked to death with cutlasses.
