OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MONTREAL TO AUTHORIZE THE CORPORATION TO TAKE STOCK IN THE MONTREAL AND BYTOWN RAIL-ROAD COMPANY, AND TO ISSUE BONDS THERE-

WHEREAS a Rail Road from the City of Montreal to Bytown, in the Ottawa District of Canada West, which shall run across the Island of Montreal, in a line or direction North of the Mountain of Montreal, and have a terminus within the limits of the said City, north of St. Lawrence Street in the St. Lawrence Ward of this City, will promote the trade and prosperity of the said City, and it is desirable and necessary to aid in the establishment and formation of such a road. The said Mayor and Council of the said City, shall be, and they are hereby authorized and required, from time to time, and as often as may be necessary, to issue, sell and dispose of Bonds or Debentures of the said Corporation of the said City of Montreal.
