ble. The Indian snacks during the day on cereals and legumes with sauces, fruits and milk sweets, all sold by street vendors.

Tapioca (similar to cassava, a root of the spurge family), corn, beans, squashes, pumpkins, sweet and white potatoes, tomatoes, hot chili peppers, tobacco, pineapples, bananas, coffee and vanilla were unknown in Europe before explorers sent them home from South or Central America. Manioc, corn and beans are still the staples of the people of the Amazon drainage basin.
