has also issued a report stating that in their opinion the situation calls for the building of a post office at that point.

Previously different persons had sought to buy the lot in question, but in view of the high price paid, the Government would not consider any offers which were made.

I am not sure whether Mr. Fred Brook voted for me last time or not. I do know that he scarcely speaks to me on the street, and also that he repeatedly talks against me behind my back. I did not canvass him during the election, but I did canvass his son, who has just passed 21, and he refused to give me any definite answer.

The only sympathy which I have for Mr. Fred Brook is that he has a very fine family and that his daughters have practically taken on the responsibility of running the store.

In view of the fact that it is my intention, at a later date, to apply to the Government for the building of a post office, I would not care to see the Minister on behalf of Mr. Brook. I merely give you these facts in order that you may know the local situation.
