

- Q. What were you doing between 2 o'clock when you said you arrived at the Fortress and the time you left?
 A. We were looking for the place where to get the ammunition.
- Q. Do you know how many drinks Brisson had during that time, approximately?
 A. No sir.
- Q. Could you say it was closer to one or closer to ten?
 A. I believe it is closer to ten.
- Q. Where did you go when you left the Fortress?
 A. We went to a civilian house where the Regimental Pioneers are quartered.
- Q. What did you do there?
 A. I took only one glass and he took a few.
- Q. Can you say approximately how many?
 A. I wasn't there.
- Q. Glasses of what?
 A. Still the same drink, the same kind of drink.
- Q. Can you describe to the Court what kind of a drink that was?
 A. The colour of ordinary rum.
- Q. Would you call it a wine or alcoholic drink?
 A. Alcoholic drink.
- Q. Have you ever seen that type of alcohol before?
 A. Never until we started to work with the Germans.
- Q. Do you know if the Germans used it for drinking?
 A. I never saw them using it as a drink.
- Q. Where did you go when you left the Pioneer's house?
 A. The accused was in the house, I waited outside by the truck.
- Q. For how long?
 A. 15 or 20 minutes.
- Q. And what did you do after that?
 A. After that we went to the garage at that time, we were then to go to the Carleton & York.
- Q. Did the liquor at that time have any effect on you?
 A. Yes.
- Q. How did you feel?
 A. I felt sort of shivery all over, my eyes had a tendency to close and my skin seemed to be shrinking on me.
- Q. Did you still feel capable of driving your truck?
 A. I still felt able to drive my truck.
- Q. Did you feel that you knew what was going on all around you?
 A. Yes sir.
- Q. What did you do when you went to the garage?
 A. I talked with the clerk about several things which I cannot remember now.
- Q. Do you know what Brisson did at the garage?
 A. He took two or three glasses of that same drink again.
