EARTHQUAKES IN ITALY.

Rome, Oct. 30.—Earthquakes were felt throughout a wide area in Italy this afternoon. There were slight shocks at Milan, Spezia, Verona, Genoa, Bologna, Ferrara, and numerous other places. Two severe shocks were experienced at Gallarate, where several old houses were damaged.

GERMANY IS SATISFIED.

Berlin, Oct. 30.—The difference between Germany and Venezuela, growing out of the affair at Porto Cabello, where German sailors were attacked by Venezuelans, has been practically arranged. Venezuela has notified Germany that the two ringleaders in the affair have been arrested and will be suitably punished.

London, Oct. 30.—The judge sitting in bankruptcy made an order to-day for the compulsory winding up of the London and Globe Finance Corporation. This concern financed a number of gold mining enterprises in Canada and Australia, besides local transit systems in London. Mr. Whitaker Wright was the managing director and ruling spirit, and for some time the Marquis of Dufferin was chairman.

WILL RACE IN 1902

Sir Thomas Lipton Says Shamrock II is the Best Boat

Queenstown, Oct. 30.—Sir Thomas Lipton arrived here to-day on the White Star line steamer Celtic. He denied emphatically that Shamrock II. was for sale, and said he would race her in 1902 in the vicinity of New York. He added that it would be a pity if another effort were not made to lift the cup especially in view of the closeness of the last contests. Sir Thomas expressed the opinion that Shamrock II. was a better boat than Columbia. Sir Thomas denied the widely circulated rumors of friction on board Shamrock II. during the America's cup races, but a saloon passenger, who said he had talked with Sir Thomas during the voyage is responsible for the statement that there was sharp disagreement during the races between Mr. W. Jameson and Capt. Sycamore, which was not conducive to the best results, and which Sir Thomas Lipton deeply regretted.

CHILD BURNED

Between three and four o'clock yesterday afternoon the little child of Wm. Pickard, Joseph St., while making bonfires with leaves her dress caught fire, severely burning her about the body. Mrs. Pickard, seeing the child's predicament, at once ran to its rescue and in smothering the flames the child was enveloped in was badly burned about the hands and arms. DEATH SUMMONS

Another old Resident Succumbs to the Grim Reaper

The death occurred yesterday of Alexander Selkirk, at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. John McCullum, near Harwich Centre.

The deceased took a paralytic stroke yesterday, and soon passed away. He was 81 years old and was born in Scotland. He came to this in 1842, taught school in York county and also near Hamilton, was well known for his education and especially his magnificent handwriting. He came to live with his daughter in Harwich eleven years ago. Mrs. D. A. Hutchison, of this city is also a daughter of the deceased.

The funeral will take place from Mrs. McCullum's, to Maple Leaf Cemetery, at one o'clock, to-morrow.

THE OPHIR HEARD FROM.

London, Oct. 30.—The steamer Ophir, conveying the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York and the Royal party, which is just completing a tour of the world, sent a despatch by means of the Marconi wireless telegraph system to the signal station on the Scilly Islands at six o'clock this evening, announcing her arrival at a point fifty miles distant. The warship Pactolus left Plymouth at a late hour to-night, carrying mail for those on board the Ophir.

Typhoid fever is epidemic at Rockwood Asylum.

Two persons died of the plague in Liverpool during October.

Mrs. James Robertson, of Botany, an aged lady, was knocked down in the farmyard and partly eaten by a drove of hogs.

The Consumers' Gas Company is prepared to offer the city of Toronto reduction in the price of gas to 80 cents as a settlement of the dispute.

Maggie Keenan, an employee of the T. Eaton Company, Toronto, died in the osteopathic parlors of Jaguith & Frederick, where she was undergoing an operation.
