Christopher Bros. employ 40 hands, with an engine of 50 horse power to propel their machinery. Their buildings are frame, 30 x 160, 2 stories.

Plough Factory.—George McSherry employs six hands in the manufacture of iron and wooden ploughs of the best description. His buildings are frame.

Cabinetmakers.—Morrey & Rothwell use a 15 horse power engine, and employ 20 hands in the manufacture of cabinet work and house furniture of all kinds. Their buildings are frame, 100 x 30 feet, two stories high.

James McIntyre commenced business 1853. He employs 15 hands, and uses a 12 horse power engine. His buildings are 30 x 80, 3 stories.

E. Robinson & Co. employ 6 to 8 hands, and turn out everything in their line in the best style.

Erwin Caldwell is extensively engaged in the manufacture of chairs of a good quality.

Flour Mills.—James Smith's two mills afford ample accommodation to the public in flouring, gristing and oatmeal grinding. Both mills are propelled by water, and have each 3 run of stone.

The large flour and grist mills of Mr. Peter Carroll are built of frame, and have a never failing water power supplied by the Thames.

The North Star Oatmeal Mills of John Stuart, situate on Hall street, are frame, built in 1860, and are capable of grinding twelve to fourteen thousand barrels of oatmeal annually. They contain two run of stones propelled by water power. Ten hands are here employed.

The flour and grist mills of Thos. Harris & Bro. are on Queen street. They were built in 1850, of frame on stone basement. They are two stories in height, and measure 100 feet x 40 feet, and contain three run of stone. The capacity of the mill is 80 bbls. per day of flour ground and packed, in addition to custom work. Three hands are here employed.

Cauterville Tanneries.—The tannery of Thomas Brown is a large frame building, established in 1833. Mr. Brown manufactures sole, harness and upper leather, kip and calf skins.

Woollen Mills.—The Messrs. Waterhouse & Bradbury carry on an extensive business in this line at their mill situated on Queen street. The buildings are frame, four stories in height, and measure 90 x 28 feet. Water power is employed, and 14 hands are engaged in the manufacture of tweeds, flannels and custom work in general.
