

tions to be made by the Governor in Council, and that such articles when so manufactured, shall, if taken out of Bond for consumption within the Province, be subject to duties of excise equal to the duties of customs to which they would be subject, if imported into this Province from British or Foreign Markets, and entered for consumption;—and that for every such license or renewal thereof, there shall be paid a duty of \$50; such license to be renewable yearly, on the thirtieth day of June.

2. *Resolved*, That it is expedient to provide that in determining the value of goods imported into Canada (except in cases otherwise provided for) upon which duties imposed are to be assessed, the actual value of such goods on ship board at the last place of shipment to *Canada*, shall be deemed the dutiable value; And that such value shall be ascertained by adding to the value of such goods at the place of growth, production or manufacture, the costs of transportation, shipment and transshipment, with all the expenses included, from the place of growth, production or manufacture, whether by Land or Water, to the vessel in which shipment is made to *Canada*, or to the frontier of *Canada*, if the importation is by land; the value of the sack, bag, box, cask or covering of any kind in which such goods are contained, commission at the usual rate, but in no case less than 2½ per cent., brokerage and all export duties, together with all costs and charges paid or incurred for placing the said goods on ship board, and all other charges specified by law. Provided that in the case of foreign goods passing under bond through the *United States*, such charges shall only be added as may have been incurred up to the last port of shipment of such goods for the *United States*. And in the case of goods purchased in the *United States*, and not being the growth, production or manufacture thereof, the assessed value for duty shall be the fair market value of such goods in the markets of the *United States* where purchased.

Ordered, That the said Resolutions be now read a second time.

And the first Resolution, being read a second time, was agreed to.

The second Resolution, being read a second time;

Ordered, That the further consideration of the said Resolution be postponed.

Ordered, That the Honorable Mr. *Galt* have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Acts relating to Duties of Excise, and to alter the Duties thereby imposed on Spirits.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time, on Tuesday next.

Mr. *Street* reported, from Committee of Supply, several Resolutions, which were read, as follow:—

1. *Resolved*, That a sum not exceeding Three hundred and thirty thousand dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to defray expenses for collection and management of Customs (exclusive of duties refunded); for the financial year ending 30th June, 1867.

2. *Resolved*, That a sum not exceeding One hundred and twenty thousand dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to defray expenses for collection and management of Excise; for the financial year ending 30th June, 1867.

3. *Resolved*, That a sum not exceeding Five hundred and ninety-five thousand dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to defray the expenses of the Post Office, viz.:—for ordinary expenditure for the year, the sum of Three hundred and twenty-one thousand dollars; and for Railway and Steam Service, the sum of Two hundred and seventy-four thousand dollars; for the financial year ending 30th June, 1867.

4. *Resolved*, That a sum not exceeding One hundred and fifty-six thousand one hundred and six dollars and twenty-five cents be granted to Her Majesty, viz.:—to defray expenses for territorial surveys for *Upper* and *Lower Canada*, at Fourteen thousand dollars each, the sum of Twenty-eight thousand dollars; for miscellaneous expenditure, the sum of One hundred and ten thousand dollars; and to the Canadian Land and Emigration Company, the sum of Eighteen thousand one hundred and six dollars and twenty-five cents (whereof Five thousand one hundred and seventy-seven dollars and eighty-eight cents has been expended in 1866); for the financial year ending 30th June, 1867.

5. *Resolved*, That a sum not exceeding Five thousand dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to defray the expenses of Stamps; for the financial year ending 30th June, 1867.

6. *Resolved*, That a sum not exceeding Seven thousand dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to defray expenses for the collection of Fines and Forfeitures; for the financial year ending 30th June, 1867.
