The cost of this work is roughly estimated at from \$60,000 to \$75,000, and it is expected that it will give a large measure of relief to those whose ands are affected, in the vicinity of Culross and Greenock townline and Culross and Greenock townline and south. Mr. McGeorge expects to have his report ready to submit to the different councils interested, early in 1926, so it is likely that the work will be proceeded with about midsummer. Under the first report submitted by Engineer Roger of Mitchell, Carrick was assessed about \$13.000.
