LEDGE OF IRON ORE

PROSPECTORS MAKE WHAT MAY BE AN IMPORTANT DISCOVERY.

An interesting strike in the form of a large body of high grade iron ore has been made in the immediate vicinity of lossland. A ledge of 40 feet of specular hematite or magnetic iron has been opened up on the Lord Roberts claim, ocated on Murphy creek, four miles from the Columbia river and half a mile south of the Heather Bell property. Samples of the ore assayed by Roy H. Clarke gave returns of 62.9 per cent iron and \$4.40 in gold.
