Baiburt, Equi-Distant from Erzerum and Tiflitz, Falls to Russia. By Special Wire to the Courier. Petrograd, July 16.—London, 5.25 p.m.—Russian troops have captured the town of Baiburt in Turkish Armenia. This information was given in an official statement issued by the Russian War Department today. Baiburt is 65 miles north-east of Erzerum, about 60 miles south of the Black Sea port of Trabzon.

AMERICAN LEAGUE BATSMEN

Show Rare Hitting Ability—Better Than National Players. A comparison of the batting averages of the players of the major leagues on the first of July, 1915 and 1916, shows that the big stick wielders of the American League are leading ten batters in the senior association this season, but three are found in that group, who a year ago, in the case of Pittsburgh, who is fifth at present, was close to 100 points below his 1915 average, and Hal Chase with the Buffalo club, was hitting fifty points below his form with Cincinnati on the first of the month.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS MOUNTING

But Vast Sums Involved Not Mean, Necessarily a Total Loss. By Special Wire to the Courier. New York, July 18.—A cable from the World from London this morning says: Commenting upon Chancellor the Exchequer McKenna's statement in Parliament yesterday, that the daily cost of the war to Great Britain has increased from \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000, the financial editor of the Morning Post predicts that the war continues to the end of the year, at the present estimate, Great Britain will have to raise in loans enormous sum of \$5,180,000,000, ding: "These are stupendous figures—but while by no means overlooking the serious position they present—they must not be regarded as such capital entirely lost, cause, since they are a part from the advances of some hundreds of millions to our allies, much of the expenditure may be said to simply represent the re-creation and distention of capital throughout the country. It is in fact, the possibility of accumulating debt, by way of inflation created by the war, which is the most serious problem presented by the situation. It is not, as is so often said, the fact that the appointment of the financial and business experts to the War Council, or the fact that the financial and business experts are organized to the fullest advantage, both during and after the war."
