Pte Clarence A. Tupper son of William Tupper Lake Paul was killed in action Sept. 2nd. He enlisted in the 246th. Batt when under 16 years of age, and was transferred to the 85th. He was a noble young man the only one from Lake Paul who has made the supreme Sacrifice

DRIVER DON C. WILSON

Don C. Wilson died in France on Oct. 16th of coal gas poisoning. He was the youngest son of Mrs. Susie Wilson of Waterville and leaves a young wife and infant son two sisters and six brothers three being in the service as follows. Norman in an English hospital, where he has undergone amputation of the right leg; Blakeney, now suffering from shell shock and gas poisoning, also in an English hospital, and Lester S. now undergoing treatment in a hospital in Halifax.

TED COCHRANE

Ted Cochrane son of the late Chas F. Cochrane of Kentville was killed in a motor accident in France in August last. He leaves a widow and one son. He was buried in a little cemetery at Ligny France.

He was a fine specimen of manhood a favorite with all who knew him at Kentville and Halifax. Besides his own family he leaves one half brother and three half sisters Mrs. J. J. Sawyer of Steam Mill was an aunt. He went overseas with No. 9 Canadian Stationary Hospital and later joined the Canadian Ry troops. In May 1917 he was chosen dispatch rider for Battalion headquarters and made a great success of his work. He was untiring in duty and never flinched from danger.
