THE CAVALIER OF FRANCE.

In fact, the whole company is well balanced, the costumes of the ladies are ravishingly beautiful and the scenery magnificent. By a careful test of two farmers, one of Colchester South and the other of Colchester North, Gordon P. Wright and Marwood Barrett, they found the following results from corn put in hogs, dressed as follows: Hogs at \$4.50 bring the farmer 40c. for his corn per bu.; hogs at \$5.50 bring the farmer 50c. per bu. for his corn; hogs at \$6.50 bring the farmer 60c. per bu. for his corn. So the hog and the corn are all right. This test was made four years ago.

## AN AMERICAN DEFEAT

Attack Filipinos and Find the Enemy too Strong For Them.

Washington, Oct. 27.—The war department has received a despatch from Gen. McArthur, giving an account of a fight in which a small detachment of the American troops attacked a much larger force of Filipinos.

Manila, Oct. 26.—Oct. 24 First Lieut. Febliger, 40 men, Co. H, Thirty-third Regiment, U. S. infantry volunteers; Second Lieut. Grayson V. Heidt and 60 men of Troop I, Third Cavalry, attacked insurgents 14 miles east of Larvigan, Ilocos province, Luzon. Developed strong positions occupied by 400 riflemen and 1,000 bolomen under command of Juan Villamor, subordinate of Tinos. Desperate fight ensued, which was most creditable to the force engaged, though under heavy pressure of overwhelming numbers our troops were compelled to return to Narvican, which was accomplished in tactical, orderly manner. Acting Assistant Surgeon Bath and a civilian teamster, captured early in the fight, were released by Villamor. According to their accounts the insurgents are very much stronger than reported herein, and their loss, at a moderate estimate, was over 150. The Americans had six killed, nine wounded, and four missing.

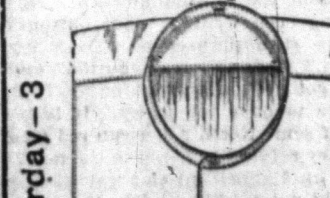
