IMPORTANT CASE ADJOURNED.

Question of Provincial Rights Before the Supreme Court. Ottawa, May 8.—From a constitu-tional standpoint probably the most important case to be heard by the su-preme court is that of the C.P.R. v. the Ottawa Insurance Company. It involves the question of provincial rights and the hearing was adjourned until June 3.

until June 3.

The argument is whether the company, incorporated under a provincial act, can make contracts within the province to insure property situated

province to insure property situated without the province.

The issue was of such far-reaching consequences that re-argument was ordered so that federal and provincial interests might be heard on the constitutional question involved.

There was an array of counsel for the Dominion, E. Newcombe, K.C., Deputy Minister Justice; for Ontario, W. Nesbit, K.C.; for Quebec, H. Gervais, K.C., M.P.; for New Brunswick, Hon. Wm. Pugsley, K.C., Attorney-General and Premier; for the C.P.R. (appellant), G. F. Shepley, K.C., and Mr. Maybee; for the Ottawa Fire Insurance Company (respondent), Messrs, Ewart, K.C., and Burritt.

Mr. Gervais said that on account of the absence of Premier Gouin in Great Britain he was unable to have a proper case prepared, and asked for an adjournment, and in October 15.

a proper case prepared, and asked for an adjournment until October. If some of the contentions were sustain-ed the provinces might as well go out of husiness

It was finally decided that the case should be heard on June 3, all the other provinces represented agreeing. The case arises through the C.P.R. being insured against indemnity for claims for fire damages due to sparks from engine. A claim was instituted by parties in the State of Maine for timber destroyed by fire. The Ottawa Insurance Co. disputed the railway company's claims. The railway company was defeated in the lower courts and appealed to the supreme court.

FOY TO GO TO ENGLAND.

Will Represent Ontario At Imperial Educational Conference. Educational Conference.

Toronto, May 8.—While there has been no definite announcement it is understood that Hon. J. J. Foy, Attorney-General for Ontario, will be sent to represent this province at the imperial conference of education, which will take place in London this summer.

Representatives will be present from all the dependencies of the empire, and among the matters to be dealt with are a number which are of especial interest to the Colonies.

It is proposed to endeavor to secure

dealt with are a number which are of especial interest to the Colonies.

It is proposed to endeavor to secure a uniform standard of qualifications for teachers throughout the empire, and an effort may be made to have text books as nearly alike as possible. Special attention will be given to institutions for educating the deaf, dumb and blind, and university matters will also have a prominent bearing at the conference.

Mr. Foy, it is said, will go to the conference armed with a complete outline of the educational plans of the Ontario Government, and if he picks up any ideas at the conference which are deemed worthy of adoption, the Government may enlarge their present scheme of improvement.

MAN KILLED IN CAR RIOT.

Serious Clash With Strikers in San Francisco—Many Injured.

San Francisco, Cal., May 8.—The strike of the 1,700 motormen and conductors of the United Railways developed yesterday into a riot, in which more than a score of persons were seriously hurt, some of them fatally.

At 2.30 o'clock the company made its first attempt to resume operations by sending out seven passenger cars, manned by about forty-strike-breakers. The men wore uniforms of car inspectors, and each carried a 38-caliber revolver. The start was made from the company's barn at Turk and Filmore streets, where a crowd of from 3,000 to 5,000 men and boys had gathered.
