THE RED FEATHER

"Red Feather" drew a big audience
at the Casino Opera House last even-
ing, and considering the class of the
production and the prices charged,
Chatham certainly owes nothing to
the show. Those who went expect-
ing to see a production equal to the
original, were disappointed. There
was nothing about the standard seen
in the usual comic opera. The comedy
was good and kept the audience in
the best of humor. A number of the
songs were well rendered, but the
chorus singing was weak. Taken all
in all the show pleased the audience,
and was worth seeing. Since the first
year out, it has been reduced to two
acts instead of three, and many of the
best scenes have been entirely omit-
ted, partly owing to the difficult
stage settings and the expense in-
volved in carrying the scenery. In
order to accomplish this, the plot has
been sacrificed to a great extent.
The feature of the show seemed to
be the rendition of the song "Ghosts,"
which was dramatically well executed
by Richard Karl as Fitzpatrick. The
singing of Wheeler and MacGahan
was thoroughly enjoyed. Baron Bul-
ver Strause was the centre of the
humor and his appearance on the
stage was the cause for laughter. Miss
Simpson as "Red Feather" sang well
and acted badly. Something struck
her as being humorous early in the
evening and she seemingly could not
completely regain her self-possession.
The audience succumbed to the con-
fusion when the directions called for
her stage business. Better shows
have been seen here, but the "Red
Feather" may be classed as one of
the good events of the season. There
was no complaint from the audience,
the most of whom say "Red Feath-
er" for the first time. The ap-
plause was spirited throughout, and
repeated encores were called for. The
madrigal given in the second act was
excellent and was called back several
times. A specimen in verse, another
quartet was much appreciated. The
"Prince of Good Fellows" by the
Crown Prince was given in good style.
The "Garden of Dreams" by Miss
Simpson, elicited much deserved ap-
plause. The song is perfectly adapt-
ed to her magnificent full soprano
voice, and the ovation she received
showed that the audience was not
unappreciative.

One could not help but notice the
similarity to Robin Hood in the music,
although the two productions can-
not be compared, Robin Hood being a
much superior opera.

One unfortunate feature of the
evening was the wretched electric
light service experienced at the con-
clusion of the evening. The lights
went out and the most of the people
had to grope their way out of the
house in the dark.

POLICE COURT

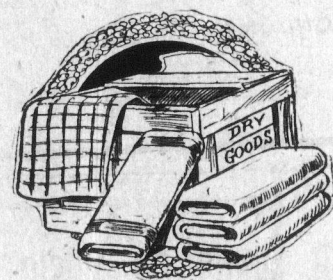
Yesterday was the day for drunks
