PREDICTS WHEAT
WILL SELL FOR A
DOLLAR A BUSHEL

Kansas Miller Declares Decline is
Inevitable—New Low
Levels

FACE THE MUSIC

Is the Advice Given Flour Mill
Managers in Southern
Kansas

Pratt, Kansas, Nov. 24.—J. B. Fri-
sbie, manager of the Pratt flour mills,
yesterday predicted that the price of
wheat will soon gravitate to \$1.00 a
bushel. The flour mill managers
might as well "face the music," he
said, because the decline is inevitable.

Wheat touched a new low level in
"Southwestern Kansas yesterday when
in the Pratt market it was quoted at
\$1.20. Six miles from here, at Luks,
it was \$1.25.

CHEAPER FLOUR AT TORONTO

Toronto, Nov. 24.—Toronto users of
flour are sharing in the latest drop of
40 cents per barrel, registered in
Montreal and Eastern points. First
tender Manitoba flour is now quoted
at \$11.80 in jute bags and \$13 in cot-
ton bags.

SCHOOL TEACHERS
PREDOMINATE IN
HOMES FOR INFIRM

Supplies Sold Cheap That Could
Have Been Used, is the
Charge

MANAGERS OF HOMES

For Aged and Infirm Could Have
Used Supplies Sold Junk
Dealers

Hamilton, Ont., Nov. 24.—Charges
that the Militia Department at Ottawa
had sold war supplies to junk dealers
at ridiculously low prices, while homes
for aged and infirm were "starved for
clothes and equipment," were made at
the first annual convention here yester-
day of the Ontario Association of
Managers of Homes for Aged and
Infirm.

It was declared that boots had been
sold for \$1 a pair, shirts 10 cents each,
flannel fatigue shirts 35 cents per gar-
ment, woolen underwear at 90 cents
a pair.

School teachers predominate, and
physicians come next, among the pro-
fessional classes that are inmates of
the homes, it was asserted.

HOGS SELL FOR
PRE-WAR PRICES

On Chicago Market on Tuesday—
Heavy Receipts at Ten
Markets

Chicago, Nov. 24.—Pre-war prices
for live hogs became general through-
out the United States on Tuesday. Big
receipts from the farms appeared to
be the immediate cause, the total sup-
ply of hogs on sale at the ten princi-
pal markets of the country being esti-
mated at 182,000 head, as against 124,
000 a week ago. In Chicago the mar-
ket closed at the bottom figures of
the day, the lowest since Dec. 15,
1916, and at an average drop of \$1 a
hundredweight as compared with Mon-
day. The practical top at the finish
was \$10 a hundredweight whereas on
July 31, 1919, hogs commanded \$23.60,
the pinhead point on record. Five
years before, the current price was
\$3.15.

Wheat Market Closes at Advance

For the first time in more than a
week the wheat market closed at an
advance on Tuesday. Brisk export de-
mand together with assertions that
liquidation was at an end, had much
to do with the strength shown. The
finish 1924 to 1925. Corn gained 24
to 34, with Dec. 1924 to 1925, and
March was nervous, 74c to 8c not
higher; oats 14c to 15c to 2%, and pro-
visions 22c to 77c.

ALLEGED LIQUOR RESORTS ARE

RAIDED—ONE BARTENDER SHOT

Escanaba, Mich., Nov. 24.—One bar-
tender was shot, probably fatally, and
thirteen alleged liquor resorts were
raided by a detail of Michigan state
constabulary under Captain Archie
Downing. The bartender is said to
have been shot by a trooper whom he
attacked with a wine glass.

THIRTEEN LIVES LOST

THROUGH FIRES WHICH
OCCURRED DURING OCT.

Toronto, Nov. 24.—During the month
of October thirteen people lost their
lives through fires which occurred in
various parts of Canada. In the pre-
vious month a similar number died
while in October 1919, sixteen people
lost their lives.

WHEAT CROP OF

FRANCE COMPARES
WELL WITH CANADA

Shows a Heavy Increase Over 1919

—France Makes Remarkable
Recovery Since 1917

Ottawa, Nov. 24.—This year's wheat
crop in France, according to official
advice, will compare favorably with
that of Canada and will show a heavy
increase of last year. For 1920, the
estimated wheat crop of the two coun-
tries are: France, 232,729,480 bush-
els; Canada, 289,498,000 bushels. The
yield per acre in France is 19.1 bush-
els, as compared with 16.5 bushels in
Canada.

Last year's wheat crop in France
was 182,489,348 bushels, the acreage
under cultivation being 11,509,275 in
comparison with this year's acreage
of 12,135,850. Since the trying days of
1917, with their heavy drain of man-
power, France has made a remark-
able recovery. In that year, France
had 10,478,620 acres under wheat and
the crop was only 94,361,356 bushels.

HUSBAND FINDS

BEAUTIFUL NURSE
ALREADY MARRIED

Milwaukee, Wis., Nov. 30.—The
romance of Nadejda Troubetzkoy,
Russian princess, given the title of
"the most beautiful Red Cross nurse
in Europe," and Captain Wallace S.
Schultz, world war hero and prom-
inent Milwaukee clubman and engi-
neer, went on the rocks when
Schultz filed suit in Green Bay, Wis.,
for divorce. The action for divorce
is based on the accusation that the
princess has a former husband, Vic-
tor A. Turin, at one time an official
of the Imperial Russian Guard, cred-
ited with being dead, but who is now
discovered to be alive and residing in
New York.

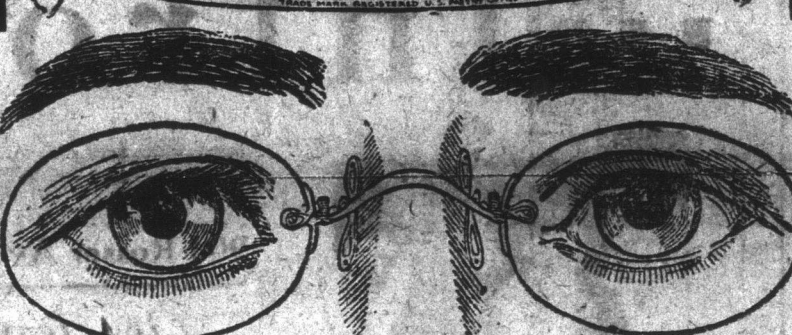
