Washington, June 2.-The high cost of newsprint paper is due in no small measure to the decimation of the forests in the east, Secretary Meredith informed the Senate today. when transmitting a report by the forest service on the scarcity of timber in the eastern States.

This is by no means the only cause of high prices, said the secretary later, but the fact remains that three fifths of the original timber of the United States has gone, and they are using the timber four times as fast as they are growing it.
