Correspondence.
Bloomfield, York Co., July 12th, 1894.
Dear Advocate:—
We left Fredericton at 6.10 sharp on the C. E. R. for Chatham and points north, and it was a most enjoyable excursion in all of the new coaches at Park Road.
It is 30 years since I was in Chatham and I am sorry to say Chatham has not improved much. The westerly end of the town has gone back nearly where it started but the lower end has made marked improvement. I was sorry to see the Millhead ship yard all in ruins also the old David Ritchie ship yard. I mention several more old industries. I must not forget to mention one great improvement in Chatham, not an open run shop to be seen and I believe from what I hear it is a hard thing to get a drink on the way. Thirty-five years ago you could get drunk as often as you liked and on Sunday take a hand in a street fight, and Sunday evening, this was before there was any police force. The Scott Act has done great good in Chatham and the Scott Act inspector is the right man in the right place.
At 2 p.m. we boarded the trim little steamer, Nelson, for Newcastle and the sail up the Miramichi is just lovely. We got a fine view of French fort, where once the warlike French planted their batteries and the grim muzzles of their guns guarded the town on Beaupre Island. I was greatly surprised at the vast improvement in Newcastle, the old square that the people used as a cattle pasture is nicely fenced in and planted with handsome shade trees, nice walks through it, and a fountain where the thirsty can cool his parched tongue. The town has some fine buildings, and is nice and clean and is a credit to its people. It is what we call a real live town. I must not forget to mention our friend the caretaker of the Post Office and Custom House. He is one of the off-hand good hearted fellows I had the pleasure of meeting north. He kindly showed us through the fine building that cost \$25,000, also the splendid system of water works worked by a hydraulic ram. After viewing the different departments he took us to his own apartments on the top floor and introduced us to his interesting daughter who is a host in herself. After some light refreshments were served it was time to start and we had a good time to our new found friends. We shall carry many kind memories of them in our hearts.
I cannot close this letter without saying a few words in praise of the conductors on the C. E. R., they are the most obliging decent lot of men I have had the pleasure of travelling with in the province.
