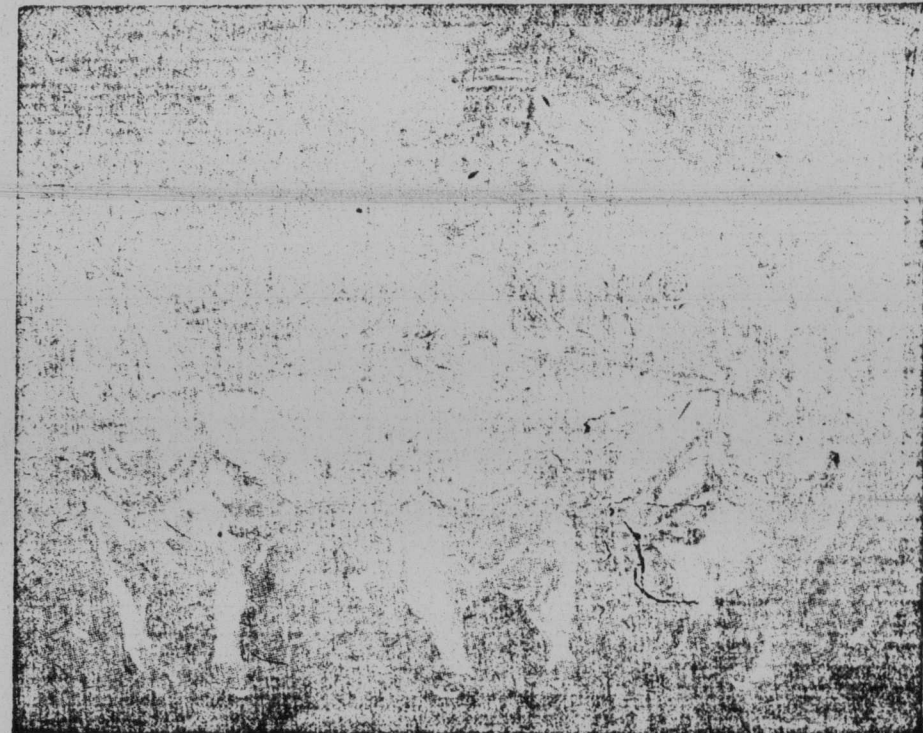

Miss Emily Devereux of Blissfield is visiting friends in town.

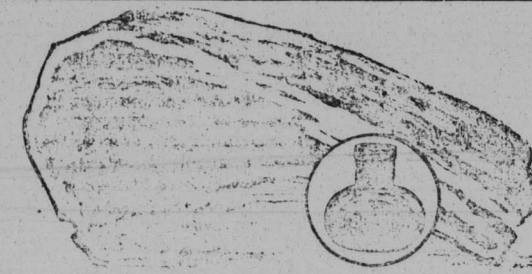
Mrs. Frank Russell has returned from Newcastle, where she has been visiting her daughter, Miss Amy Russell.
