Any person who is the s. la bead of a namily, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section o available Dominion land in Manlobs Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli cant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency; on certain conditions by father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister of intending

Daties-Six months' residence upor and cultivation of the land in each o within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres sciely owner and occupied by him or by his father mother, son, daughter, brother or sis

section slongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre Daties-Must reside upon the home

PONTIFICAL INSIGNIA ROBES AND VESTMENTS WORN ON SPECIAL OCCASIONS.

TIARAS AND MITRES

Since the days of Pius VI. the precious mitre has been used only once (by Pius IX.), and that was of the Vatican Council. The when the mitre, gold or silver, is alone used.

In the Papal treasury there are several of these tiaras; among them is one given by Napoleon I. to Pius VI, in 1805. Another, that of Gregory XVI., contains some pearls, 11 diamonds and about 146 precious stones. Isabella II, gave Pius IX. in 1854 a magnificent tiara which the Pope sold, devoting the proceeds to founding the Seminario Pio.
