BORDEN ALLIED WITH HAULTAIN

The Latter's Changed Attitude On Hudson Bay Railway Project Due to This.

Regina, July 29.—Interference by the Conservative leader at Ottawa in Saskatchewan politics is the reason offered today for Mr. Haultain's interview opposing the construction of the Hudson Bay railway by the Dominion government as a national undertaking, and adhering to the policy of having Saskatchewan, Alberta and Manitoba take the financial responsibility of building the line.

Mr. Haultain said: "If the Federal government would build the road as a Federal undertaking, so much the better, and our party is prepared to stand behind the government and give every assistance possible."

Removal of Embargo. Active Campaign Inaugurated By Protective Association, Representing Consumers.

London, July 28.—Three hundred members of parliament and several of the ministers are now pledged to a removal of the embargo on Canadian cattle. It is pointed out that no cases of disease have been reported from the two million Canadian cattle imported during the past twelve years.

What They Really Are. In Regina, and in many other parts of the Province, people are calling Haultain and his followers "Conservatives," despite the efforts to keep up the old name.

Two Informations Laid in Calgary Against P. Burns & Co. by R. N. W. M. P.

Calgary, July 30.—Two charges have been laid against P. Burns & Co. for violation of the Meat and Canned Food Act. The charges are against B. A. A FAMINE IN CROATIA. Drought in This Country of the Hungarians Part of Austrian Monarchy Causes Great Suffering.

Vienna, July 29.—At Josanyi, in Croatia, the peasants, unable to obtain fodder for their cattle, owing to the drought, have been driven to the neighboring community of Urdina and refused to depart. Gen darmes summoned to eject the intruders were met with a storm of stones and revolver shots. They fired a volley in return, killing two and wounding several others.

Outbreak of Cholera in Russia. St. Petersburg, July 29.—An outbreak of cholera is expected in southern Russia and the government is preparing to combat it. The authorities hope to prevent the disease from reaching the city of St. Petersburg.

Col. Leslie Will Resign. Toronto, July 29.—Following upon the reported shortage of \$15,000 in the accounts of Lieut. Col. K. Leslie, treasurer of the Industrial Exhibition association, the resignation of Col. Leslie as treasurer will take effect.

Many Naturalized. Ottawa, Ont., July 29.—During the past month ending Dec. 31st, 1907, 17,714 aliens naturalized in the Dominion. Of these 7,257 from the United States, 2,127 were Russians, 282 Japanese and 231 Chinese.

Canada's Great Destiny. Canadian Associated Press Cable. London, July 29.—The Times pays the highest tribute to the success of the territorial "Canada can only be true to herself as her great traditions by the creation of a community second to none on the earth."

His Last Arrest for Speeding. New York, July 30.—Alfred Lauterbach, son of a well-known lawyer, was killed instantly near Westchester this morning when his auto, going at sixty miles an hour, collided with the guard rail to the bridge. He had been arrested many times for speeding.

Oil Stove Exploded. Smith's Falls, Ont., July 29.—Robert How, a C.P.R. conductor, lost his home and two little children aged five and three years, this morning by a fire caused by the explosion of an oil stove. The mother went to a neighbor's, taking the young baby with her, leaving the two other children in their beds, above the kitchen.

Killed Boarding Train. Ely, Minn., July 29.—A Galician, Johann Fell, boarding a moving freight train, fell and was run over. He died in Portage in Prairie hospital.

Fall Seeding Already. Lethbridge, July 29.—G. H. Gardiner, who lives on the Hawkins farm about seven miles from the city has commenced seeding winter wheat. This is the first reported.

Kear Hardie Coming to Canada. St. John, July 30.—Kear Hardie, the English Labor member, will attend the Trades and Labor Congress in Halifax on September 21.

Championship Medals Stolen. London, July 29.—The gold medal which the American rifle team recently won at the Brier with the championship of the world, and another medal for American prowess in the Olympic games, have been stolen by a smart hotel thief, and General James A. Drain, who had the trophies in his custody, is also lamenting the loss of valuable jewelry belonging to his wife, which disappeared at the same time.

Dynamited Safe During Storm. Alexandria, Minn., July 29.—During a severe thunder storm this morning, which prevented the house being heard, exploded safe crackers dynamited the safe of the general store of T. E. Morris here, but only got \$70.

He Played With Matches. St. John, N.B., July 30.—The three-year-old son of James Quinn died from the effects of burns resulting from playing with matches.

Canada's Highest Mission. Canadian Associated Press Cable. London, July 29.—The Daily Telegraph says that the Quebec battlefields will be hallowed ground, consecrated forever to the genius of Canadian nationalism, and the Empire, which one world's affairs, a great part in the world's affairs. Strathcona Radial Trams. The present intention is to run one car exclusively in Strathcona between Whyte avenue and the top of the grade leading to Edmonton. Two cars will run from this point to Edmonton and up into the city, and three or four cars more will supply the needs of Edmonton at the present time. Work will be started at once in building the additions to the existing system, and this will be changed to a twenty minutes or quarter-hour service as soon as the business is sufficient to warrant it.

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Yesterday's Meeting. At the meeting yesterday afternoon the city council and the Strathcona Radial Tramway Company, who had the charter for the operation of a street railway in Strathcona, arrangements have been completed for the transfer of the Strathcona charter to the city of Edmonton. Edmonton thus gets a franchise for thirty years in Strathcona for a very reasonable sum. The amount has not yet been given out, but the Bulletin is in a position to state that an excellent bargain has been made by Mayor McDougall, who has previously carried the deal to completion by his own efforts.

By the terms of the agreement which is being drawn up and will be signed this afternoon, the Strathcona Radial Trams will construct, in the bounds of Strathcona, between two and three miles of railway, during this season, and will put it in operation before the end of the year. A half-hour service will be given between the two cities, and this will be changed to a twenty minutes or quarter-hour service as soon as the business is sufficient to warrant it.

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
