BAGS OF OATS HELD LIQUID CONTENTS

Mounted Police Overhaul Load of Grain at Edson and Find Bottles of Whiskey Hidden in Sacks.

That whiskey concealed in bags of oats is being smuggled into Edson from Edmonton was the astonishing fact brought to light some days ago as the result of investigations made by the R.N.W.M.P.

For some time past the police have had suspicions that liquor is being smuggled into Edson in blind pigs. Accordingly, Sergt. Tucker, R.N.W.M.P., caused a strict surveillance of all freight shipped into Edson to be made.

Last week fifty bags of oats arrived from Edmonton via the Grand Trunk Pacific. The suspicions of the police were aroused by the fact that the bags were sewed up and not tied with a cord as is the usual custom.

At present the Mounted Police in Edmonton are working on the case. It has been ascertained that the liquor was bought from a certain firm and paid for by a cheque on the Imperial Bank signed by C. Francis. As yet Francis has not been located but a search is being made for him.

THEY WOULD PROHIBIT THE EXPORT OF FISH

Suggestions Made to Dominion Fisheries Commission to Conserve Western Fisheries—Prof. Prince Says Commission Will Advise Stocking Some Lakes With Game Fish.

The members of the Fisheries Commission appointed by the Dominion Government to investigate the fisheries of the province of Saskatchewan and Alberta, arrived in the city last night and will hold their first session in the offices of the board of trade at 10 o'clock this morning.

After the session in Prince Albert the commissioners undertook a long trip to the north-western part of the province, examining the Big Deer Lake and the Big and Little Trout Lakes, from the first of which exceedingly valuable fish are taken. The quality of the white fish here has been taken. In the two Trout Lakes the finest species of lake trout, ranging up as high as 30 pounds is found.

Prof. Prince, who has been connected with fisheries for many years, yielded to the suggestion of the other members of the commission to stock some of the lakes with game fish. The commission is composed of former Chief Justice McGuire, of Prince Albert, Dr. Slesley, of Calgary, and Prof. E. Prince, of Ottawa, Dominion commissioner of fisheries, who is chairman. Sessions have been held in Regina, Prince Albert, Lethbridge, Wynyard, Battleford, Saskatoon and Brantford. At all of these sessions in Saskatchewan there was a large attendance and the greatest interest was manifested by the fishermen and settlers in the work of the commission.

Prof. Prince stated to the Bulletin last night that the evidence submitted to the commission up to the present had revealed that in a protest against the invasion of the Western Canadian lakes by the great American Fish corporations.

HENRY VIVAN SCORES THE UNITED STATES

British M.P. Says She Needs Twentieth Century Application of Liberalism—Young Men's Liberal Club Gives Enthusiastic Address on Principles of Liberalism.

"The principles of Liberalism and the place of Liberalism in the great work of advancing civilization" was the subject of an eloquent address delivered by Henry Vivian, member for Birkbeck in the British House of Commons, before a gathering of members of the Young Men's Liberal Club in the club rooms last evening.

The address delivered by Mr. Vivian to the Canadian Club yesterday and his able exposition of the policy of free trade in the Separate School Hall on the previous evening were warmly received. He wanted the power to create and to use what he did create, to be the share of the nation, not of the few. He wanted the nation to be the seat of the highest civilization, and the attendance last night numbered fully one hundred.

Humanity, declared the speaker, was indebted for all that was really worth having to the progress of Liberalism and its application to the problems of life. Liberalism was in its essence the application to the progress of everyday life of the law of progress. There were two conflicting tendencies in every human being and state of society. The one was the tendency to the progress of the individual, and the other was the tendency to the progress of the community.

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WIND DEMOLISHES

A large section of the solid brick wall on the west side of the new Dominion Bank building in course of erection at the corner of McDonald and Jasper was blown down during the furious wind storm that raged for a brief period yesterday afternoon.

The remaining portion of the wall, extending to the full depth of the building and rising unsupported twenty feet above the first floor, was moved very noticeably in its upright position and would doubtless have fallen if the wind storm had continued. It is probable that the greater part of the wall will need to be demolished and rebuilt, causing a delay in the completion of the work of several days.
