The capt. of the Cuban revenue cutter, which held up the British schr. Marion, has made an official report on his detention of her. He states she was acting suspiciouly close ashore near Cape Maisi. He suspected smuggling and sent a boat with an officer who examined the manifest and cargo of the schooner, the captain offering no objections. As no evidenc of smuggling was disclosed the schi was allowed to proceed.


